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## CAPTURE RUSS REGIMENT

RETREATING RUSSIANS EASY PREY, BERLIN SAYS.

Fully Equipped Regulars Abandon Guns and Equipment as They Flee From Invaders.

London, Feb. 28.—Advancing Germans are capturing entire regiments of Russian soldiers, reported to be retreating and offering no resistance to the forces of the kaiser.

Fully Equipped Regulars Quit. This was made known when the official report of the German war office was published showing that north of Dorpat, 175 miles northeast of Riga, German troops captured two regiments of fully equipped Russian regulars who were retreating, abandoning guns and equipment as they fled.

No Defense Attempted. No defense was attempted by the Russians, the Berlin war office statement added, which is taken to mean that the Muscovite soldiers are as a rule ready to throw down their arms and leave the defense of the revolution in the hands of the workmen and the women.

Foe Talk Proved Sham. Germans in the region of Pskov have been ordered by General Hoffman, in charge of the operations there, to continue their advance, regardless of any action that may be taken by the Bolsheviks.

Such an order, coming on the heels of the acceptance of German peace terms by the Russians, means the kaiser is intent only on seizing Russian territory and that his protestations of no territorial acquisitions amounts to nothing.

Rescue Party Nearly Trapped. Crystal Falls, Mich., Feb. 28.—Attempts to recover bodies of 16 miners, trapped in a level of the Amasa Porter iron mine, 550 feet below the surface, have been abandoned. After 104 hours of continuous effort a rescue party was almost trapped by a second flood of water and quicksand which again filled the shaft.

600 Die in Chinese Disaster. Washington, Feb. 28.—More than 600 persons, mostly women and children, were crushed and burned to death when the grandstand at the annual race meeting in Hong Kong, China, collapsed, Consul General Anderson has notified the State department. No Americans are believed to have been injured.

Largest Wooden Ship Launched. Orange, Tex., Feb. 28.—With none of the pomp usually attending such ceremony, the largest wooden steamship ever built was launched on the Sabine river here just five months after its keel was laid. The steamship was built for the Cunard Steamship company of Liverpool.

## ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF LITTLE FALLS GROCERY AND COFFEE COMPANY

We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 58, General Statutes of Minnesota for 1915, do hereby associate ourselves together as a body corporate and do hereby agree and adopt the following Certificate of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be Little Falls Grocery and Coffee Company.

The general nature of its business shall be to buy, sell and deal in wholesale, in groceries of all kinds and description provisions, meats, canned goods, fruit and vegetables and other merchandise which may be needed to carry on such business or any business as may be incident thereto.

It may acquire, hold, sell, lease and mortgage any real, personal or mixed property of every kind and nature, and may be necessary, incident and pertaining to the conduct of said business.

ARTICLE II. The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be in the City of Little Falls, Morrison County, Minnesota.

ARTICLE III. The time of commencement of this corporation shall be March 6th, 1918, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years.

ARTICLE IV. The names and places of the persons forming this corporation are G. W. Firstahl, John A. Pohl and C. L. Ffirstahl, all of Little Falls, Morrison County, Minnesota.

ARTICLE V. The management of this corporation shall be in the hands of three directors who shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the stockholders to be held on the Second Wednesday in March of each year. The first annual meeting of this corporation shall be held on the first Wednesday in March, 1918.

The first board of directors shall be the incorporators, to-wit: G. W. Ffirstahl, John A. Pohl and C. L. Ffirstahl. G. W. Ffirstahl shall be president and John A. Pohl shall be vice president and C. L. Ffirstahl shall be secretary and treasurer. All officers of the corporation shall be elected annually for the period of one year. The directors and officers of this corporation shall hold their respective offices until their successors have been duly elected and entered upon the discharge of their duties.

ARTICLE VI. The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand Dollars and shall be paid in, in money or property or both, as the Board of Directors shall prescribe. The capital stock shall be divided into five hundred shares of par value of One Hundred Dollars each.

ARTICLE VII. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars.
