FARM BUREAU NOTES

One hundred and ninety-four people have joined the Morrison County Farm Bureau.

Fourteen farmers in Morrison county were supplied with seed corn from Cokato, Big Lake and Litchfield. Nine others were supplied with home grown seed, which had been picked up by the demonstrator and taken to the Farm Bureau office, where it was sold to others without any additional cost.

Grim alfalfa, buckwheat and flax seed have been secured for farmers on short notice through the help of the Extension Division in St. Paul.

Eleven hundred bushels of seed oats were obtained by the Farm Bureau and farmers asking for seed were readily supplied.

Farm laborers have been secured for several farmers and persons wanting work should apply at the Farm Bureau office.

Four hundred and eighty-five barberry bushes have been eradicated in the county which should eliminate the black rust from our wheat crop.

Six persons who followed instructions for poisoning cut worms have met with good success and their crops have not been troubled further.

Three spraying demonstrations were given in the country and as yet the treated bushes are free from insects and diseases.

Drainage and dynamite demonstrations will be given free of charge by specialists from now until October 15. Any persons wishing such work done should apply at the Farm Bureau office.




