To the laity it would seem that the American Red Cross enjoys complete omiscience. Only last week a young wife in Aberdeen was called on by a local Red Cross visitor who came to cheer and help her. The girl had not asked for, nor did she need financial aid. She had not even asked for the things she did need, friends and interest. But because of the lack of these she was possessed by an overpowering loneliness for her soldier husband and could not recover from a mild attack of influenza. She did not confide in anyone, as she is almost a stranger here. But she did write a "blue" letter to her soldier. An interested officer learned that he was anxious about his wife who was in Aberdeen without relatives, ill and discouraged.
