BOARD OF COMMERCE

PRESIDENT STEPHENSON RE-SIGNS—J. C. PATIENCE SUCCEEDS HIM AS DIRECTOR.

J. W. Stephenson's resignation as president of the Little Falls Board of Commerce and as a member of the board of directors was tendered at a meeting of the board of directors Friday evening. His resignation was accepted and he was extended a rising vote of thanks for his excellent services. The secretary was instructed to write him and thank him for what he has done for the city and to express the official and personal regrets of the officers and members of the organization over the loss of Mr. Stephenson as an active member. In his letter of resignation Mr. Stephenson explained that business reasons made it necessary for him to change his address to Minneapolis. He retains his membership in the organization.

J. C. Patience was unanimously elected a director in place of Mr. Stephenson. The election of president to succeed him was deferred until a later meeting.

A. H. Vernon was instructed to draft a bill relating to assessments for certain public improvements and to submit same to the representatives.

Secretary Olson was instructed to communicate with the proper authorities in an effort to get the Babcock law amended so as to permit refunds to cities and villages as well as counties for road work done in accordance with the law.

The traffic bureau was instructed to look into the matter of providing a landing place for aeroplanes.

The publicity bureau was authorized to provide postal cards and other suitable advertising literature to be distributed to visitors attending the convention of the Minnesota State Federation of Women's clubs, to be held here the latter part of this month.

The committee on entertainment was instructed to arrange for the quarterly meeting on Monday evening, Sept. 22. Supper or refreshments will probably be served at that meeting.

JUDGE FILES FINDINGS IN TWO COURT CASES.
