

### BIG YIELD OF CLOVER

MORRISON CO. FARMERS GET SEVEN BUSHELS TO ACRE—\$4.536 FOR TWO LOADS.

Motley Mercury (19): Probably the biggest check ever given for a single delivery of farm produce was written this week by C. M. Broom, when he gave Milander & Ediburn a check for \$4,536.90 for two loads of clover seed which they delivered to him on Tuesday. The seed was raised on their Morrison county farm in Scandia Valley township, and yielded them an average of about seven bushels to the acre.

This yield probably sounds big to people who have not lived long in this land of the "Big Red Clover" and it is probably above the average but yields as large or larger than this frequently occur. With clover seed selling at \$25 per bushel or better a farmer does not have to raise many acres to pay for his farm.

### PIERZ


Pierz Journal (18): Frank Fuhrman moved to the Anton Veith farm this week.
