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BURGLARY ARRESTS

THREE LOCAL YOUNG MEN UP FOR STEALING LIQUOR - ONE HELD TO GRAND JURY.

Mat Newman, Ted Grest and Joe McGregor of this city were arrested Wednesday, charged with the theft of a quantity of liquor from the basement of the Buckman hotel, belonging to Mat Miller.

Grest had his hearing before Judge Lyon yesterday morning and he was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of burglary. His bonds were fixed at \$300.

McGregor has admitted that Grest and he picked the lock on the door leading to the hotel basement, Sunday night, and took the liquor, which they brought to the home of Mat Newman under a previous understanding with him, and were paid \$45 for same.

Paul Dombovy of Platte town has established a new record for productivity of the soil, this farmer receiving a check for \$3,213.47 this week for medium red clover seed raised on a 10-acre tract of land.

The seed was sold to Charles Van Hercke of this city. It weighed 7,487 pounds and the price per bushel was \$26. The gross proceeds from this 10-acre tract, accordingly was \$321.35 per acre, which is little short of marvelous.

Wm. Hohn from the land that had made up the Cochran farm just at the southern limits of the city and east of the N. P. track, were all disposed of by auction, the sale ending Wednesday. The manner of sale was unusual here and attracted considerable interest.

Another change in ownership in business blocks was made this week, when Tom Picotte purchased the "Y" block from Mrs. Gaudet, the sale being made through F. X. Heroux.

George F. Ferrell of this city appeared before Judge Lyon Monday evening to answer to a charge of carrying shot-guns in his automobile which were set up and ready for use. The complaint was made by a Staples game warden, who stopped Mr. Ferrell and his companions when they were out hunting Sunday, and took the guns away from them. Mr. Ferrell pleaded guilty to the charge and was assessed a fine and costs totaling \$41. He paid this, the game warden promising in open court to return the guns.

Under the state hunting laws a gun carried in a car or rig must be taken apart or enclosed in a case.

Mrs. Clara Plante, wife of Ludger Plante, died Sunday morning at 1 o'clock at St. Gabriel's hospital. She was 47 years old. Mrs. Plante recently was operated upon for appendicitis and gall stones.
