**AN APPRECIATION.**

The Oakland Cemetery association has been able this past month to complete the re-making of the old roadbed, leading from the cemetery to the city, and the public, who gave so generously in funds to making this improvement possible, and the city council, who gave the services of the street commissioner and his crew towards putting the job on, and all others who helped by word or deed, are hereby thanked for their public spirit and co-operation. Without this, owing to the high cost of labor and difficulty of getting the work carried for within the sum at hand, it would have not been possible, and the work might have gone over for another year. The wisdom and advantage of doing the work by city employees and supervision is shown by the fact that the cost was only about half what the lowest bidder on the contract had asked—hence the apparent delay and procrastination on the part of the cemetery officials in charge of the funds, and it was only this past month that the city street forces could be detached to perform this work. The cost to the city was nothing, as all expenses were met with the funds raised for that purpose by private subscription two years ago, but the obligation is fully acknowledged by the cemetery officials for this and the previous grading the city council had done preparatory to undertaking this work.

It is of course a matter of fact that some additional labor will be expended on this roadbed, as needed, until proper levels are reached and time has elapsed for the clay and gravel to settle permanently. Commissioner Charles LaFond says the material used on this road is the best he ever saw, and in a reasonable time will become one of the best roads in the county. It is the intention of the cemetery officials to keep this road up as a fitting memorial road! The clay and gravel used was hauled from a point about 1/4 mile south from what is known as Doten's hill and occasion is taken now to thank him and the officers of the town of Little Falls for permission to take this valuable material.

**LINSEED COMBINE CHARGED**

Government Begins Suit Against Thirteen Manufacturers.

Washington—Charging violation of the antitrust laws, the department of justice has commenced a suit of equity against 13 of the leading manufacturers of linseed oil. The bill of complaint, according to an announcement of the department, was filed at Chicago.

It is charged that through an unlawful combination and conspiracy existing since October, 1918, prices for linseed oil have been maintained at artificially high levels. Four Minneapolis companies and one Red Wing company are among the defendants.

**JUSSERAND IS FIRST GUEST**

President Entertains For First Time Since Illness.

Washington—President Wilson and Mrs. Wilson entertained informally at luncheon Ambassador and Mme. Jusserand, who will sail for France for the summer. It was the first time since the President was taken ill last September that a member of the diplomatic corps had been entertained at the White House.

**DETECTIVE AND BANDIT SLAIN**

Battle at Waterloo, Iowa, Results in Killing of Two.

Waterloo, Iowa—Detective William Goodenbauer was instantly killed in a pistol battle with a bandit here and the bandit was killed by William Wilson, patrolman. The bandit was attempting to cash a money order stolen in Bertha, Minn. There was nothing in his clothing to give a clue to his identity.

**Pope Injures Arm.**

Rome—Pope Benedict has injured his right arm and is unable to write or celebrate mass, according to a Vatican announcement. Specialists declared the condition of the arm was not serious.

**Turks Admit Greek Success.**

Constantinople—Official statements issued by the Turkish Nationalist headquarters of Mustafa Kemal Pasha, under date of June 24, 25 and 26, admit successes by the Greeks in the center of their drive eastward into Anatolia. The statements, however, claim successes for the Turks in the Pergama area and north of Smyrna and declare that the Turks are in general control of the Greek advance. The nationalists say that there was absolute quiet on the entire front on June 26.




