

NEW BAKERY WILL OPEN SEPT. 11
The new sanitary bakery on Broadway east will open its business on Saturday, Sept. 11, according to the owners, Medved and Kobilka. The delay in opening is due to the failure of material for the building to arrive. A fine new building has been erected to house the bakery, just west of the "Y" block. The bakery will be equipped with the latest in equipment and machinery, including a portable baking oven with a capacity of 300 loaves every 40 minutes; a double-arm dough mixer; sanitary bread racks, etc.


