

EXHIBIT COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT TO COUNTY BOARD

The state fair exhibit committee made its report to the county board at the meeting Tuesday. They informed the board that the first prize had been captured, giving the silver loving cup and that \$300 in prize money was received. The expense of putting on the exhibit was given as \$786 and they reported a shortage of \$106 above the county donation and collections. The board authorized the committee to deduct the amount of the shortage from the prize money and turn the balance in to the county. About \$100 worth of exhibit material is available for future exhibits.

It was thought that the exhibit belonged to the county and one commissioner proposed selling it, saying that an offer of \$50 had been made for it. County Attorney Rosenmier informed the board that the exhibits were not the property of the county and hence the board had nothing to sell.

BOX FACTORY BUILDING TO BE FIXED UP AT ONCE

At a meeting of the industrial and finance committees of the Board of Commerce Tuesday evening, it was decided to arrange at once to have the old planing mill building fixed up for the box factory that is going to be located there. A communication from the president of the company stated that they are ready to move here as soon as the building is ready. The finance committee will raise the \$5,000 promised toward fixing the building, immediately.
