### D. M. CAMERON ACCEPTS OFFICE OF COUNTY ATTORNEY - FEETIONS ALLOWED

County board met in regular monthly session Tuesday.

Acceptance received from D. M. Cameron, county attorney, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the present county attorney to take effect December 1st, 1920, he having been appointed by the county board at its October meeting, to fill the vacancy to occur on December 1st, 1920. Mr. Cameron's bond was approved.

Milberry, Lundberg, and Roehleau appointed committee to inspect bridge at Upsala, said committee to meet at said bridge on Saturday, November 13, 1920, at 2 o'clock.

Hearing granted on petitions of freeholders to be set off from school district to another. A. E. Smith from district 143, Todd county, to district 2, Morrison and 46 Todd. G. C. Lamb to be set off from 155, Todd county, to 62, Todd; 12 Cass; 27 Morrison. Frank Janz from 13 to 63, Michael Gange from 29 to 131.

Committee to repair of bridge at Motley, between Morrison and Cass counties, report that they met with the Cass county board on October 9th, 1920, and found said bridge repaired according to plans and specifications and did accept same.

Report was approved and Auditor instructed to issue his warrant to the Minneapolis Bridge Company for \$879.94, full payment on part of Morrison county.

The Highway Engineer was instructed to make necessary surveys and plans, construction of that portion of state roads 1-7-8, according to preliminary estimate submitted by him.

Final hearing on three petitions for formation of three new school districts out of territory now in consolidated school district Number 111, were granted.

Final hearing on petition for formation of a new school district in towns of Granite and Pulaski and after listening to arguments for and against same, petition was laid over to the December meeting.

Petition to annex section 5-129-29 to Green Prairie, from Pike Creek was granted.

Hearing granted on the following petition: Carl E. Peterson to be set off from District 12 to 117.

Petition of Matt Miller to be set off from district 117 to 118 was granted.

Hearing granted on petition for formation of new school district out of territory in consolidated district Number 111.

### Died

Mrs. Anna Docken, a resident of Morrison county for many years, died Saturday evening at 10:55 at her home in St. Cloud, at the advanced age of 71 years. Death was due to heart trouble and complications.

Mrs. Docken was born in Norway, July 22nd, 1840. She came to this country when a young girl. The family moved to Morrison county in the 90's, locating on a farm in Buckman town. ### \$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT TO BE TRIED TODAY - SEVERAL INDICTMENTS

Suit for \$10,000 damages is brought by Mrs. Anna Bentfield of Genola against J. Harsch et al., also of that place, in action which comes up for trial in district court this morning. Mrs. Bentfield alleges that Harsch and three other men, John O. Hagen, Wm. W. Poster and Peter Sayer, entered her home on September 23 with out warrant and in the presence of her husband and son berated and abused her and threatened her with arrest for keeping a disorderly house.

Yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, the jury returned a verdict for the defendant in the case of J. M. Totten vs. John F. Joswiak. Mr. Totten sued Mr. Joswiak for \$100 damages for a dog which Joswiak was supposed to have shot and killed. Joswiak held that the dog had killed valuable rabbits belonging to him and that he killed the dog when the animal was after more of them.

Great, who is serving a term at the state reformatory at St. Cloud for burglary, was brought up from there yesterday and arraigned by the court on a charge of carnal knowledge, for which he had been indicted by the grand jury. He pleaded "not guilty" and his trial was set for next week. He was taken back to the reformatory to await trial.

Yesterday, the case of William Nagel vs. William Sandrock was tried, same going to the jury late yesterday afternoon. The plaintiff in this action asked \$175 for damage to his automobile which he alleged was due to negligence and carelessness on the part of the defendant.

The first case scheduled for trial, that of Sol Schapiro vs. The Aetna Casualty & Surety Company, failed to materialize as the defendants did not appear. The judgment was accordingly entered in favor of the plaintiff.

Several indictments were returned by the grand jury, which made its report Saturday morning and was discharged. Only one indictment was made, that of John McLaughlin, indicted on a charge of murder in the first degree. He is charged with the murder of James Kelly on a freight train, near Randall, last summer.

The case of W. L. Pratt vs. Peter Holm, et al., which came up for trial Monday, was dismissed by the court on motion by the plaintiff.

Several persons indicted by the grand jury were brought into court Monday and arraigned. Max Greene of Burtrum was arraigned on a charge of second degree assault and upon entering a plea of "not guilty," he was released on \$500 bail, for final trial. Clarence Henry of Burtrum is the complainant in this case, he alleging that Greene attacked him and assaulted him severely as he was on his way home from a party in company with a lady.

E. H. Hanson, Sylvester Lodermeier, Martin Wojcikowski and J. F. Ziegler of Royallton, indicted on charges of permitting gambling devices in their buildings or places of business, pleaded "guilty" to the charge and each of them was fined \$25 and costs.

Anna Bentfield, indicted for adultery, was arraigned in court Tuesday morning and was arraigned. She entered a plea of "not guilty" and was ordered held for trial.

James McColl, negro, indicted on a charge of murder in the first degree, was brought before the court Tuesday for arraignment. His attorney, D. M. Cameron, asked the court to be permitted to withdraw as his counsel. The court granted the request and L. W. Vasily was appointed in his place. It was consequently necessary to give the new counsel time to prepare his case, and the trial of the defendant, McColl, is charged with the murder of James Kelly, a transient, on a freight train near Randall, late last summer. He was captured in Northtown by detectives and brought to Staples, where the dying man, it is alleged, identified him as his assassin.

Wednesday noon, James McColl, negro, was arraigned and pleaded "not guilty" to the charge of first degree murder. His trial was set for next Monday.

The case of Mike Vinsaraki vs. John Philip was dismissed on motion by the plaintiff. This was a damage suit for trespass.

A verdict for the plaintiff was returned Tuesday in the case of F. E. Letzing, et al., vs. James Lambert, et al. The plaintiff sued for recovery of a silo removed from the farm by the former owner and which was included in the purchase price of the farm.

The case of Wm. J. Billstein vs. Frank Thomsen was placed at the foot of the calendar due to the absence of a material witness.

The case of P. E. Schauble vs. the Genola Farmers' Produce & Potato Association was settled out of court.

On motion by plaintiff, the case of K. O. Sandum vs. Steve Nouis, et al., was dismissed with prejudice.

The divorce suit of Mary Laban vs. Martin Laban was settled without court action.

### BE A HELPFUL BYSTANDER AUTHORIZED BY THE NORTHERN DIVISION OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS

These terms are simply two different names for the same thing, and possibly there is no other condition which is so apt to puzzle one, as just this state in which one may be found lying because there are so many causes for it. As for instance, severe injuries to the skull causing concussion and compression of the brain. Also certain diseases of the brain as apoplexy, epilepsy, hysteria; shock, trauma, and when the patient faints, shock, poisoning, sunstroke, heat exhaustion, bleeding, electric shock, frostbite and suffocation. Be careful to ascertain from by-standers what the cause is. If no one is able to explain, or none but a doctor, and the patient is there, then quickly study person and surroundings, and examine for any of the causes as mentioned above. If there is evidence that the patient is in a position where help can be given, do it. If the patient is pale, keep the head low, but if flushed, raise the head slightly, loosen tight clothing, arouse and when consciousness returns, give stimulant, preferably aromatic spirits, ammonia (15 to 20 drops in 1/2 glass water). If there is profuse bleeding, stop it by applying tourniquets, keep patient on side in recumbent position so that in event of blood loss the blood will not flow from the head. If the patient is unconscious, they will not choke. Blood which is coughed up frothy and bright red, indicates pneumonia. If the patient is dark red in color, when they revive give chopped ice to suck and apply cold water to the lungs and stomach, as case may be.

Injuries to head with continued incontinence of urine and feces, general care of condition and patient attention till medical aid arrives.

Remove to quiet place, loosen clothing, keep the head over, and the body warm with covers and when conscious administer stimulant as above.

If in case of condition was suffocation, following amoke, gas or water, remove to quiet place, loosen clothing, keep the head over, and the body warm with covers and when conscious administer stimulant as above.

If electric shock, remove cause, if still near cause, and if lungs action has been performed, artificial respiration. When breathing is restored and consciousness returns, give stimulant as in shock. If heat exhaustion, body will be cold and clammy. Remove to quiet place, loosen clothing, keep the head over, and the body warm with covers and when conscious administer stimulant as above.

### SEVERAL MEETINGS HELD DURING WEEK ON SEWER ASSESSMENTS

The city council met in adjourned regular session Thursday evening for the purpose of receiving the report of the city engineer on sewer assessments. The sewer in question was the one built this summer on Third street northeast from First avenue to Broadway, thence west to Second street and south to First avenue and the extension on Broadway sewer from Wood street to the bridge. The report showed the total cost of this sewer \$20,973.60 and the city's share
