## ROBBERY AT BOWLUS

**\$150 IN BILLS OBTAINED AT BROS SOFT DRINK PARLORS—ONE ARREST**

Burglars on Thursday night of last week broke into the soft drink parlor at Bowlus owned by Joseph Birros and rifled the till, securing about \$150 in currency. No trace of the perpetrators of the deed has yet been found. Arthur Busse, 48 years old, was arrested as a suspect but he denied having any connection with, admitting, however, that he had previously entered the place and stolen a revolver valued at about \$5.00. Mr. Birros discovered the burglary Friday morning, when he came down to open the place for the day. He at once notified the county sheriff, who is now working on the case. Checks in the till were not taken and the burglar likewise left about \$10 in change that was in the money drawer. Mr. Birros found a \$20 bill lying on the floor, evidently having been dropped by the burglar.

Entrance to the place had been gained through a window. There were finger prints on the window sill and these may lead to the arrest of the burglar. Busse, following his arrest as a suspect was assigned to county jail. Geritz of this city Saturday but he declined to consult an attorney, whereupon the case was adjourned until in the afternoon of that day to enable him to communicate with an uncle in regard to securing bonds for his release. The young man was unable to secure bonds and he refused to appeal to his father, Herman Busse of St. Paul, formerly of Bowlus, because, he said, his father had sent him out last fall and told him to earn his own living. The sheriff consequently remanded him to the county jail.

Ex-soldiers who are suffering disability in any degree which is traceable to war service are urged by the federal board for vocational education to get in touch with same at once. The address is Federal Board of Vocational Education, 600 Keith-Plaza Bldg., Minneapolis, Minn. District headquarters will be maintained at St. Cloud on February 9, 10 and 11 for the purpose of giving the men residing in Morrison, Mille Laes, Kanabec, Stearns, Kandiyohi, Benton and Sherburne counties a chance to present their cases. By writing to the federal board at Minneapolis, transportation will be sent, affording the opportunity to go to St. Cloud and present the case to the traveling board.
