

ROYALTON JEWELRY STORE BURGLARIZED

\$300 WORTH OF JEWELRY TAKEN FROM F. B. LOGAN STORE—ARRESTS EXPECTED

Jewelry valued at \$300 comprised the haul of burglars who visited the F. B. Logan jewelry store in Royalton village Friday night. Entrance to the store was gained by breaking a window in the rear end of the store room and releasing the bolt which held the door.

At first, the owner believed that the burglars had not taken very much but after a careful check of the stock, he found that enough jewelry had been taken to start a small jewelry store. Among the things taken were two gold watch chains with gold knives, two gold knives, eighteen lavallieres, thirty-six scarf pins, six pair of cuff buttons, eight gold collar fasteners, a gold pencil six open face watches and one wrist watch which was at the store for repairs, four belts with gold and silver buckles, and three sets of gold cuff links and scarf pins.

During the summer months Miss Pascova will sing in over fifty western cities. She will be one of the star attractions on the famous Redpath-Vawter Chautauqua Circuit. She will appear on the fourth day of the Chautauqua.

This pretty Australian diva had a very flattering honor thrust upon her toward the close of last season. She was selected as, "The most attractive opera singer now appearing before the American public," by a celebrated Scandinavian sculptor and, as a result, was the most talked of member of Mary Garden's great opera company, not even barring Mary herself.

Miss Pascova is a stately blond beauty with a voice of transcendent loveliness. She already has a big following in the United States and great things are predicted for her.

GOVERNMENT OFFERS 5 1/2 PER CENT CERTIFICATES

The United States government offers for sale through the federal reserve bank of Minneapolis a limited amount of United States Treasury Certificates of Indebtedness at 5 1/2 per cent, for one year from June 15. The certificates are offered in denominations of \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000 and \$100,000. Remittances must accompany subscriptions, which may be placed through the local banks. By the purchase of these certificates, individuals, firms and corporations subject to income and excess profits taxes may procure, in anticipation, a 5 1/2 per cent investment, which will be accepted in payment of taxes June 15, 1922. The government also offers a limited amount of U. S. Treasury Notes maturing in 3 years at 5 1/2 per cent interest, in like denominations. Neither issue bears the circulation privilege.

LAND CLEARING CONFERENCE AT DULUTH JUNE 20-21

A conference of county agents of the northeast district will be held in Duluth June 20 and 21 to discuss questions relating to land clearing. Several men from state experiment stations and the university farm will speak on the various phases of land clearing and there will be experimental work and study of delayed clearing as advocated by Supt. Thompson of the Northeast Experiment station. At the meeting on the second day, the county agents will consider county appropriations, administrative requirements, farm bureau matters, record systems, publicity and other matters of importance.

To expedite the issue of medals, if ex-service men will leave their discharges with any bank in their city, the bank will forward them to the recruiting office and they will return the discharge and the medal to the bank, retaining the discharge only one day. They are now in a position to issue medals to those who served in engagements in France.

American Legion Corner

The official U. S. Headstone provided on request by the government for the graves of great war veterans, is of American white marble 40 inches by 2 1/2 inches by 10 inches. Each stone has a 2 1/2 inch circle on the front face, near the top, in which a Maltese Cross or The Star of David is carved, according to the creed of the deceased.

Regulation blank on which to apply for U. S. official headstones has been mailed to each Minnesota Legion post. Copy may be secured from Legion Service Bureau, Old Capitol, St. Paul. These stones are supplied for unmarked graves only. They will not be supplied for graves which have already been provided with private headstones.

The total number of claims of various kinds which the Minnesota Legion Service Bureau, Old Capitol, St. Paul, has secured action on since its organization in August, 1919, is 10,843, up to May 31, 1921. The number of claims received during May totaled 735. Claims include everything from travel pay-back pay, death claims, \$60. federal bonus, to compensation claims, insurance reinstatements, vocational training, etc.

Legion Loses its Chief

Words fail to express the sorrow with which the Legion and the Nation regard the accidental death of Frederick W. Galbraith, Jr., National Commander of the American Legion. He was a leader to be proud of, a great fighter, a loyal advocate of the cause of ex-Legion and affectionately will his memory linger. As a symbol of sorrow, the flags and charters of Minnesota's 483 Legion posts will be draped for thirty days. A special tree on the Victory Memorial Drive in Minneapolis, was dedicated to his memory June 11th. "On Fame's Eternal Camping Ground, his silent tent is spread, and glory guards with solemn round, the bivouac of the dead. Nor wreck, nor change, nor winter's blight, shall dim one ray of glory's light, that kills his deathless tomb."
