

SCHOOLS HERE OPEN ON TUESDAY

SUPERINTENDENT GIVES OUT INFORMATION ON ENROLLMENT—LACK THREE TEACHERS

Public schools of Little Falls open for the 1921-22 term next Tuesday, September 6. Superintendent E. B. Bergquist has submitted the following information relative to enrollment, and the names of the teachers thus far engaged:

All departments of the public schools of Little Falls open on Tuesday morning of the coming week. All sessions in grades below the seventh open at 8 a. m. and Senior and Junior high schools at 8:30 a. m. Those enrolling in the high school for the first time should consult the high school principal either this week or on Monday preceding the opening of school.

Fall entries in the primary grades were six years ago before the first of next January. Those who are 6 by June 1st, next, may enter the mid-year division in January.

Grade pupils should enroll at the building nearest their residence. Later in the term adjustments to even up attendance in various buildings may be necessary.

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COUNCIL BUYS MORE FIRE HOSE

ORDER DIVIDED BETWEEN TWO CONCERNS—JETKA GETS COAL ORDER

At an adjourned regular meeting of the council Monday evening, bids were received for 500 feet of fire hose. Five bids were submitted and representatives of four of the bidders were present and outlined the features and quality of their brand. The W. S. Nott Company and the United States Rubber Company bids were accepted, each for 250 feet. The Nott bid accepted was for a single jacket wax and gum hose, \$1.00 less 2 per cent 30 days, and the U. S. Rubber bid was for a single jacket white cotton hose, the Red Cross brand, at \$1.20 per foot, less 2 per cent 30 days.

Mayor Berghem's appointment of members of the library board were approved. Those appointed were Mrs. A. A. Barton, Rev. A. Lamoth, E. J. Richie and F. A. Nelson.

Bids were received for 50 ton of coal for the city hall. The bid of Julius Jetka, \$9.60 per ton delivered, was accepted.

The street committee was instructed to investigate breaks in the outlet of the Third avenue sewer and sewer and report at the next meeting.

A claim for reimbursement of \$109.82 was presented by City Attorney Vernon in behalf of W. H. Muncy for judgments and expense incurred as police officer as the result of civil actions brought against him by defendants in a recent federal prohibition enforcement case, Messrs. Kuschel and Fonck. Mr. Vernon also presented his own claim for \$75.00 as attorney's fees in defending Mr. Muncy. Both were allowed.

STATE CONFERENCE OF SOCIAL WORK

Governor J. A. O. Preus will address the opening session of the State Conference of Social Work which is to be held in Hibbing from the 10th to the 13th of September. Frank J. Bruno of Minneapolis, the president of the Conference will give the presidential address and others who are expected to appear on the program are Robert W. Kelso of Boston, the president of the National Conference of Social Work, Dean J. H. Wigmore of the Northwestern University Law School and Miss Gertrude Valle of Denver, nationally prominent in the field of social service.

Meeting jointly with the Conference will be the State Association of Probate Judges, the county chapters of the Red Cross, the State Association of County Commissioners and officials charged with the enforcement of laws relating to children which will include members of county child welfare boards.
