FRONTIER WIN AGAIN IN RAIL RATE FIGHT

Organized farmers won another victory in their fight for lower freight rates on agricultural products, when the Interstate Commerce Commission refused to re-open hearings on grain and hay tariffs, according to farm bureau officials.

Rate experts predict that this reduction will mean an actual saving of \$50,000,000 to American farmers in the next 12 months.
