LAKES-TO-OCEAN PROJECT LAUNCHED

HUGE WAREHOUSE AT DULUTH AND FLEET OF SHIPS LAUNCHED BY \$2,500,000 COMPANY.

Duluth, July 25.—Inauguration of a lakes-to-ocean service in advance of the deepwater project is virtually assured through the announcement today of definite plans for the erection of a large terminal warehouse on the local waterfront and building of a fleet of modern electrically propelled freighters for operation between Duluth and New York.

The building alone will represent an investment of \$1,750,000 and McDougall Terminal Warehouse company, operators, will be capitalized for \$2,500,000, according to an announcement today by A. Miller McDougall, son of Captain Alexander McDougall, world famous shipbuilder.

Refrigerator and package freight will be inaugurated next spring, McDougall said.

What is considered an important feature in the project is that quarters will be provided for diversified wholesale industries, such as dealers in perishable lines, requiring refrigerator service and terminal facilities.

The company will control the Minnesota-Atlantic Transit company, which will build during the winter and place in operation next spring two 2,000-ton Diesel electrically driven ships. The ships will operate between the company's terminal here and eastern distributing points, as far as the New York state barge canal.

A. Miller McDougall, M. W. Alworth, Stephen R. Kirby and Henry Nolte of Duluth, and A. S. Hanford of Sioux City, Iowa, are named as directors of the warehouse company. Its officers will be A. Miller McDougall, president; M. W. Alworth, vice president; S. R. Kirby, second vice president and treasurer, and A. T. Henning, Jr., secretary.

S. R. Kirby was formerly of Little Falls, connected with the First National Bank.
