Veterans Get House Plans at "U" Farm

House plan No. 220 of the farm building series, prepared and kept on hand by the farm building section of the agricultural engineering division at University Farm, has been used, with some modifications to give variety and meet the requirements of various locations, by nearly 30 former world's service men who have built themselves homes at Argonne Farms, originally known as Orchard Gardens, just south of Minneapolis.

These plans are for a one story house, 22x24 feet, containing four rooms. The building sites are plots of a few acres upon which the veterans have located to keep poultry and to grow fruit and vegetables.

Prof. H. B. White of University Farm, in charge of the farm building section, reports a steady call for plans for homes, barns, sheds, and various other buildings. Many of these calls come from outside the state. "Better Farm Homes," meaning not only substantial buildings but an improved and well-kept site, is the slogan of the section represented by Mr. White.

Nationally Known Women on Program For Farmers

Two women of outstanding pre-eminence in the fields in which they are doing their life work have been engaged for a series of lectures at Farmers' and Homemakers' Short Course week at University Farm, January 1 to 6.

Dr. Amy L. Daniels was one of the principle speakers before the health institute of the National Dairy show, and returned to the twin cities the week of October 22-23 to speak before the general session of the Minnesota Education association. Now she will make a third visit to give four lectures the week of Farmers' and Homemakers' Short Course at University Farm. In addresses on "Child Care and Feeding" she will clear away some of the problems encountered in infant nutrition and adequate diet.

Miss Mignon Quinn is coming to the short course with the avowed intention, she says of converting every farmer's wife and every farmer before the week is over to the need of recreation in breaking up and brightening the general monotony of farm life, and

Hanson of University Farm, dairy extension specialist in charge of cow-testing work, predicts that Minnesota will have at least 50 active cow-testing associations by the first of the new year.

ORCHARD AND GARDEN

If onions are frozen for storage they should be kept frozen till time to use them in the spring. Darwin tulips are worth planting for the beauty of their effect in late spring. Some varieties may also be forced in the house.


There have been some excellent varieties of zinnias on the market this year. Many of these are excellent for decorations and to use as cut flowers. After the first snowfall is a good time to get rid of rabbits about the orchard. Organize a hunt and get a few of them before they injure the fruit trees.

Good winter window boxes are made by using small evergreens. Cedar is perhaps best for this purpose. Sometimes small branches are cut and set in soil. Small rooted plants set in the soil are better.

Wash the dust from the ferns and palms occasionally. This will keep them in better health and brighten up the foliage. Watch for scale and mealy bug. They may be removed in the early stages with soap and water. —LoRoy Cady, associate horticulturist, University Farm, St. Paul.
