Proceedings of the County Board of Equalization.

Little Falls, July 16, 1878.

County Commissioners met at the office of the County Auditor to equalize assessment for the year 1878. Present, N. Meyer and N. Gravel, County Commissioners; and J. D. Lachance, County Auditor. Each having taken an oath to equalize fairly and impartially said assessment, they proceeded to review the same.

On motion duly seconded and carried, the board of equalization adjourned until Tuesday, July 16, 1878, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Little Falls, July 16, 1878.

Board of equalization met at the office of County Auditor pursuant to adjournment. Present, N. Meyer and N. Gravel, County Commissioners; and J. D. Lachance, County Auditor.

On motion of N. Gravel duly seconded and carried, the valuation of real estate in the township of Cudrum was ordered to be raised fifty per cent.

On motion of Nicolas Meyer duly seconded and carried, the valuation of real estate in the township of Pierz was ordered to be raised fifty per cent.

No changes made in the townships of Buckman, Bellevue, Green Prairie, Swan River, and Two Rivers.

No changes were ordered made in the assessment of the personal property in the several townships in the County. Board took a recess until 1 o'clock P. M.

At 1 o'clock P. M. Board met pursuant to adjournment. All present. The equalization of the assessment being done, on motion duly seconded the Board adjourned sine die.

Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

Little Falls, July 22, 1878.

The Board of County Commissioners met at the office of the County Auditor. Present, N. Meyer, chairman; S. Heneboller and N. Gravel, County Commissioners; and J. D. Lachance, County Auditor. The Board was called to order by the chairman.

A petition for the formation of a new school district to comprise the following described territory, all of township 127, range 31, in Morrison County, and also section 18 in township 127, range 30, having been examined and proofs being made of due service and posting of notices, on motion of N. Gravel duly seconded and carried, said petition was duly allowed, said school district to be known as school district No. 22.

Bill of Dr. A. O. Gilman for medical services to Anton Jendro was presented to the Board and examined, and on motion duly seconded and carried, the same was disallowed in full.

The bonds of Remi Marotte for selling liquor in the village of Little Falls were presented to the Board; and on motion duly carried, the same were approved, and license granted to said Marotte for the term of six months from the first of May, A. D. 1878.

The Bonds of Louis Vasaly and of Rhodes, Spencer & Wetzel for selling liquor in the village of Little Falls were presented to the Board; and on motion duly carried, the same were duly approved and license granted for the term of six months, commencing May first, A. D. 1878.

A petition for the formation of a new school district in the town of Two Rivers to comprise the following described territory, to-wit: Sections No. 23, 24, 25 and 26, in township No. 127, range 30, having been examined and proofs being made of due service and posting of notices, on motion of N. Meyer duly seconded and carried, said petition was duly allowed, said school district to be known as school district No. 23.

A petition for the formation of a new school district in the town of Swan River to comprise the following described territory, to-wit: Sections 21, 22, 26, 27, 28, 33, 34, and 35, in township No. 128, of range 30, having been presented to the Board, it was ordered that the County Auditor post up notices according to law, and the 28th day of October, 1878, was designated to hear said petition.

A petition for the formation of a new school district in the town of Little Falls to comprise the following described territory, to-wit: Sections 11, 12, 13, 14, 23, 24, and 25, in township No. 129, of range 30, having been presented to the Board, it was ordered that the County Auditor post up notices according to law, and the 28th day of October, A. D. 1878 was designated to hear said petition.

On motion of N. Meyer duly seconded, James Laubert, Sr., and Peter Roy were duly appointed appraisers to appraise the State lands and school lands in the County of Morrison.

Board then proceeded to count county orders cancelled and redeemed, and after marking the same paid in the order book, they were destroyed by

fire by the County Commissioners. Amount of County orders cancelled and redeemed, \$2,944.14. County poor orders cancelled and redeemed \$257.80. Amount of road orders destroyed, \$75.00.

N. Meyer, chairman; S. Heneboller and N. Gravel, County Commissioners of Morrison County, Minn., being duly sworn, say that to the best of their knowledge and understanding, the following amounts are necessary to be raised to defray the expenses of said County for the year 1878: First, for general County expenses, six thousand dollars. Second, for poor purposes, one thousand dollars. Third, for road purposes, one thousand dollars. Fourth, for general school, one mill.

Board then adjourned until 8 o'clock A. M., Tuesday the 23rd day of July, 1878.

Little Falls, July 23, 1878.

Board of County Commissioners met at the office of the County Auditor pursuant to adjournment. Present, N. Meyer, chairman; N. Gravel and S. Heneboller, County Commissioners; and J. D. Lachance, County Auditor.

According to the instructions of an act entitled "An act to increase the number of County Commissioners in Morrison County to five," on motion of N. Gravel duly seconded and carried, the Board proceeded to re-district said County as follows:

That the townships of Belle Prairie and Green Prairie be and they are hereby made a commissioner district to be known as commissioner district No. One.

That the townships of Pierz and Buckman be and they are hereby made a commissioner district to be known as commissioner district No. Two.

That the township of Little Falls be and it is hereby made a commissioner district to be known as commissioner district No. Three.

That the townships of Bellevue and Two Rivers be and they are hereby made a commissioner district to be known as district No. Four.

That the townships of Cudrum and Swan River be and they are hereby made a commissioner district to be known as district No. Five.

On motion of N. Meyer duly seconded the Auditor was duly instructed to send a copy of A. J. Clark's opinion about re-districting the County to the Attorney General.

The following bills were presented to the Board of County Commissioners, examined and allowed as follows: Parrot, Upton & Sherman, stationery, \$ 60.25 Pioneer Press Co., books and stationery, 74.25 H. C. Stivers, printing, 110.77 O. W. Sylvester, lumber for poor purposes, 2.00

Wm. Fuller, sundries, 5.95 J. H. Rhodes, sundries, 7.83 J. T. Sillwell, work on Court House, 2.50 J. D. Lachance, stationery for Agdt.'s office, 12.00

J. T. Sillwell, making coffin for poor, 7.00 J. V. Vower, abstract from Land office, 7.50 Dr. A. Guernon, medical services to poor, 45.75 Leon Houde, Clerk of District Court, 81.42

Board took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

Afternoon session, all present. On motion of N. Meyer duly seconded and carried, the sum of four hundred dollars was appropriated out of the County road fund to repair road, leading from the town of Little Falls to the town of Pierz, said money to be expended under the supervision of N. Gravel, County Commissioner, said money to be paid when the Board will meet again on the 28th day of October, A. D. 1878, if the amount of work done on said road will be worth said sum.

The following personal property taxes having been reported by the County Treasurer as uncollectable, after due consideration the same were abated: John Cackery, gone to New York, \$ 5.47 W. M. Young, " " Kansas, .95 H. H. Peterson, " " Utah, 12.71 E. B. Gregoire, " " Red River, 11.58 Jon. Fourrier, " " " 2.83

The following bills were duly presented to the Board, examined and allowed: N. Fabin, fixing Court House, \$2.00 S. Heneboller, County Commissioner, 8.40 N. Gravel, " " " 7.60 N. Meyer, " " " 6.00 L. Vasaly, medicine to poor, 1.95

On motion of N. Gravel the sum of twenty-five dollars was appropriated out of the County road fund to fix County road from Platte River Mills to the town of Pierz, especially on section No. 36; said money to be expended by Narcisse Gravel, and the job to be received by the Board of County Commissioners, and paid for as soon as the job is done and received.

On motion of S. Heneboller duly seconded, the sum of one hundred dollars was appropriated out of the County road fund to help the town of Bellevue to repair the road leading from Bellevue to Two Rivers, said money to be expended by S. Heneboller

County Commissioner, and paid for as soon as received by said Heneboller.

On motion of N. Meyer duly seconded and carried, the County Treasurer was authorized and directed to turn over from the County poor fund to the general County fund the sum of five hundred dollars, the same to be used to pay County orders outstanding.

On motion of N. Meyer duly seconded, the County Auditor was authorized and directed to have maps of the different townships in Morrison County made, the same not to cost over one dollar and fifty cents each.

On motion duly seconded the Board adjourned until the 28th day of October, A. D. 1878.

NEWS ITEMS.

The finances of Louisiana are reported to be in a better condition than ever before.

St. Paul Dispatch. Within the past week or two the Northern Pacific has carried up over 200 men to work upon the road, who, after getting a full meal at the company's expense, strode off into the country for the harvest fields, and that without leave or license.

Cincinnati Star. The prayer of Rev. Mr. Moore at the Republican Convention in Music Hall a few weeks ago was the first instance on record where a prayer was received by the listeners with applause. But the minister prayed that the convention might indorse the course of President Hayes, and this was so in accordance with the spirit of his hearers that they couldn't help applauding the sentiment.

Pioneer Press, July 19. The Indians over in Wisconsin are still howling over their squaw dance, and the people are not yet entirely over their scare. Some Indians from the Leech Lake reservation went over to participate in this exciting dance, which revived the silly rumor that the Sioux were making a treaty of peace with the Chippewas, and that war, bloodshed and untold disasters were imminent. There is no likelihood, however, that anybody will be frightened by such ridiculous fabrications.

A Complication Settled. St. Paul Pioneer Press. The gratifying announcement can be made in the Pioneer Press this morning that the differences between the St. Paul & Pacific and the Northern Pacific Railroad companies in reference to the joint use of the line between St. Paul and Sauk Rapids are soon to be amicably and satisfactorily adjusted. It is known that these two great lines of railroad, traversing as they do the northwestern areas of Minnesota, and both competing for a portion of the western and northern freight, have been in a measure rivals, and hence it has been no easy matter to agree upon a common basis of settlement for interchanging service.

Besides, numerous questions have arisen which have served to complicate still further the original causes of the difference, and the officers of the respective roads having failed to agree upon a basis of settlement, they have wisely consented to submit the whole question to disinterested arbitrators, whose decision will be accepted by both parties as a finality. Mr. Chas. B. Wright, president of the Northern Pacific, has been in St. Paul for some days, during which time he has been in consultation with the trustees and general manager of the St. Paul & Pacific, and the result has been that the parties concerned have signed an agreement to submit the points in the controversy to disinterested arbitrators. President Wright has selected as one of the members of this high joint commission, Mr. Robert Harris, of Chicago, superintendent of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad, and Mr. Farley has named Mr. J. F. Tucker, of Chicago, general freight agent of the Illinois Central road.

Both these gentlemen are experienced and competent railroad men, and it is likely that if they accept the position, they will, looking at the matters in dispute from an entirely impartial stand-point, be able, without the assistance of a third arbitrator, to arrive at a basis of settlement which will be satisfactory to both parties.

At all events, the pleasantest and most cordial relations exist between the gentlemen who are managing this treaty in the interest of both roads, and the public at large will be highly gratified to know that there is now a certainty that both the Northern Pacific and the St. Paul & Pacific railroads will soon work in entire harmony, and as these roads are doing an immense traffic, which is rapidly on the increase, there is reason to hope that the necessity for better facilities for transacting their immense business at St. Paul, will prompt them to inaugurate measures for the erection of union passenger and freight stations at their terminal point on the Mississippi river, which will be a credit to the roads and to St. Paul.
