Blaine is in New York state this week.

Cleveland is making speeches in New York and New Jersey.

The probabilities are that White will be elected in the first district by a small majority.

Bismarck is building a \$50,000 brewery so as to be prepared for the next session of the legislature.

Philetus Sawyer U. S. Senator from Wisconsin claims that Blaine will carry that state by 10,000 majority.

The Republican majority in Ohio for canal commissioner is 17,000. This is a fair test of the situation to-day in that state.

Republicans and Democrats are both claiming Indiana and New York, and are doing hard work in those states.

Wilbur F. Storey, the great Chicago journalist, died at his home on Monday evening. He was one of the most energetic newspaper men the world has ever known.

C. F. Kindred has resigned the presidency of the First National bank at Valley City to settle the question of his right to cast one of the seven votes of Minnesota for Blaine.

The St. Paul papers are taking as active a part this year in the congressional campaign between Strait and Donnelly as they did two years ago in the Nelson and Kindred fight.

W. F. Vilas, the chairman of the late National Democratic convention at Chicago has been nominated for the legislature in the Madison, Wis., district. It is doubtful if he will accept.

There are three tickets in the field for the city offices in New York city—a Tammany Democracy ticket, a county Democracy ticket and a Republican ticket. There is a large amount of illfeeling between the supporters of the Democratic tickets, and the outlook for Cleveland in that city is far from good.

**Who Are Entitled to Vote.**

Pioneer Press: Letters are received almost every day by the Pioneer Press, asking for information as to the qualifications necessary to enable a man to vote at the coming election. Summed up as a whole, the information desired is here, with given. As regards the right of a foreign-born citizen to vote, one correspondent asks:

Can foreign-born citizens, who have only been in the United States one, two and three years, and have their first papers out that long, vote for president of the United States on the 4th of November, or rather the electors? There are many foreigners here who have only been in the States three years, have not declared their intentions and have not got their second papers out. I am instructed that they cannot vote for presidential electors.

The state constitution plainly settles that point. There is only this difference between a foreigner and an American-born citizen: The foreigner must reside in the United States for one year and take out naturalization papers before he can vote. Otherwise he is placed identically on the same footing as an American. The American born citizen is required to reside in the state four months, and in the precinct in which he votes for ten days, preceding any election, in order that he may exercise the right of suffrage in Minnesota. The same requirements are exacted of the foreign born man, with the addition that he must reside in the United States for one year preceding the election and take out naturalization papers.

It doesn't make the slightest difference whether these papers are his first, second or third. He can reside in New York, or anywhere else in the United States, for eight months, and live in Minnesota for four months preceding an election, and he has the privilege of declaring his intention and taking out naturalization papers one year, or six months, or one day before the election or on election day.

**Wheat in England.**

Washington, Oct. 26.—The monthly report of the commissioner of agriculture, just out, contains some interesting facts concerning the crops and grain market of Europe. It seems that stagnation and depression in prices are agitating the farmers of Europe as well as of this country. There is little, if any, profit to the farmers, and it is believed that the inevitable result will be a reduction in the acreage of wheat next season. The crops have been unusually large, and the abundance there, as well as elsewhere, has furnished a supply almost unprecedented, and vastly in excess of the demand. The disheartening price which all grain is now bringing is even a severer blow to the farmer than the bad crops of previous years, and coming when their resources are pressed to the utmost, the future is looked forward to with dismay. The papers are teeming with farm statistics showing the cost of raising grain per acre, and the resulting money returns in the markets. Average English wheat brings \$1.03 per bushel, which is less than it can be raised for in that country. A year ago, when the average was 20 per cent higher, it was said there was no money to be made with average crops at that price, and now, as the reductions in rent have not kept pace with the falling of the markets, the amount of loss per acre is the only question. A writer from Great Britain estimates the wheat yield of that country for the present year at over 74,000,000 bushels. He estimates the requirements of the 56,000,000 of people to be fed at over 200,000,000 bushels, of which 74,000,000 are supplied at home, leaving 126,000,000 bushels to be imported from foreign countries. About this amount was imported last year. The writer continues:

The stock of foreign wheat in the warehouses on Sept. 1, 1883, was known to be enormous, and this stock has probably been reduced. The total price of wheat during the past year has also caused a large proportion of home grown wheat to be consumed by stock, and the still lower prices which are likely to prevail during the coming year, will tend to increase the consumption. The imports of foreign wheat during each year, do not, therefore, at the present time supply so reliable a measure of the annual requirements, as was the case formerly, when the stock of foreign wheat had not assumed such gigantic proportions.

This condition of the grain market in Europe, which draws so heavily from our supply, it is believed, will result in a large reduction in the acreage in this country next year. With an increased foreign demand and a smaller supply, the price of cereals would be raised, movement of the crops would become more active and a better condition of things generally is predicted for next year.

**An Opinion of Maynard.**

From the Trainee Journal.  
Judge Maynard, the Democratic nominee from Todd county for the legislature, is eighty four years of age. He does not appear to remember anything that has occurred since 1856. The last political work of any consequence that he ever did was making speeches for the Democratic ticket when Buchanan was running for president. He is a long winded political speaker, and is exceedingly bitter against the Republican party, believing a Republican to be anything but a gentleman. He was born in the good old slavery days, when human flesh and blood was bought and sold at public auction, and he says he does not want to die until he can leave the country in as good condition as he found it. At the Democratic rally last Tuesday night Judge Maynard was cautioned by Reformed Democrats not to slander the Republicans as he usually does, and the old champion of human slavery got mad about it and chopped off his intended trade with the excuse that he was tired. He cracked a few jokes and sat down. His real home is at Willmar, but he has been at Long Prairie a year or more gobbling up the farmers' lands on tax titles where the owners have become delinquent on their taxes.
