LOCAL ITEMS.

Clidaro is a good one. The fresh show draws immense crowds. Rev. J. H. Hays will preach at the Congregational church on Sunday, Sept. 4. Large crowds have been in Little Falls every day this week. The race horses will remain in Little Falls until after the fair is held. And this is the kind of weather we wanted a couple of months ago. The Union Band has purchased a new tuba of Dyer Bros. of St. Paul. Tomorrow evening the board of education will hold a regular meeting. Little Falls hotels and restaurants were crowded to their utmost capacity yesterday. Parties indebted to Ressler & Hall are notified to settle with Mr. Hall within twenty days. The Ladies' Guild of the Episcopal church will meet with Mrs. S. P. St. Paul on Thursday, Sept. 8. Lon Nell of Green Prairie has moved to Little Falls, and occupies the Ducler residence on First street. E. D. Hamilton has torn down the partition in his building and now has the whole building for his own use. J. W. Bonek came up from Royalty on Saturday and took time to look over the water power improvements. Postmaster Wetzel is going to be a sportsman, too, and has imported a fine blooded dog from St. Cloud. Miss Jono Lindbergh, of Attorney Lindbergh's office, is in St. Paul, where she will study bookkeeping for a month. J. M. Cota has moved his barber shop into the new building just south of his old location, and is fixed neat and tidy. The Ladies' Working Club of the Congregational church will meet with Mrs. J. R. Steele on Wednesday next, Sept. 7. During the past week the meadows and brushland on the west side have been the favorite grounds for chicken hunting. St. Cloud's boom has taken an unexpected turn on account of the decision of the Manitoba railroad stock and stock market there. Johnny Brown returned from Dakota yesterday looking hearty and feeling well. He left here with a railroad outfit early last spring. Rev. A. J. DAM AND CANAL.

How Work is Progressing on the Water Power Improvement. One hundred more men are wanted by the Water Power Company within the next week to work on the dam. A Northern Pacific construction train is now at work building spur tracks on the west side down to the canal. Material can be shipped directly to where the work is progressing, and a large amount of timber and granite will immediately be sent in. A force of men are now at work framing the timbers for the false dam to be put in on the west side of the island and this temporary structure will soon be put in on the dam. Part of it will be in place by the end of the week. Mill men and manufacturers should bear in mind the fact that the Little Falls water power has no superior, (all things considered), in the world. The improvements will be permanent and substantial beyond all question, and the work is being done in the most thorough and careful manner. It is now the most interesting field for parties desiring to erect mills and factories. Contracts have been closed by the Water Power Co. with Gravel & Goulet Bros. for 250,000 feet of timber and lumber for use on the dam. Part of it will be brought from Royalty and part from Gravelville. The company has also contracted with A. C. Wilson & Co., of Royalty, for 200,000 feet. The lumber from Royalty will mostly be delivered by rail, as the spur track is now built down to the canal. Secretary Williams of the Water Power Co. has received several letters during the past week from mill men inquiring about terms, etc., upon which power and sites for mills and factories could be obtained from the Little Falls Water Power Co. These letters were from men interested in various industries, including wood and iron working and flour milling. Mr. W. is positive that mills will be built upon their property here as soon as the power is ready to be used. Mr. E. O. Williams of New York city was in Little Falls on Saturday last to look over the progress of the water power work. While here he made arrangements for the construction of a residence on the west side, near the end of 11th street. Work will be begun on the foundation immediately. Mr. Williams is a capitalist of considerable means, and is investing in business and manufacturing enterprises. He regards the chances here for profitable investment in those lines as unexcelled. It is the plan of the Water Power Co. to have mills that use their power located at the east side of the canal, and branch canals will be built from the main canal to the river, about 200 feet through which the water to furnish the power will be run. Of course these canals will be covered, and will be built only as they are needed to furnish the power. The mills will be built so as to leave room between them for a wagon road and the spur tracks of railroad will be run down between the mills and river. There will also be a roadway on the east side of the mills. This way of providing power is the most satisfactory and economical that will be ample room on both sides of the sites. AN IMPROVEMENT CO. Louisville Capitalists Form a Company to Handle Little Falls Real Estate and Building Improvements. An Improvement Company has been formed by capitalists from Louisville, who have lately become interested in Little Falls. Among those interested are Samuel Castellan (who is president), A. T. Gilmore and G. G. Strater. These gentlemen were in this village a few weeks ago, and returned to their homes enthusiastic over the prospects for the building up of a thriving manufacturing center here. The company is capitalized for \$100,000, and all the members are wealthy and will not hesitate to advance any amount necessary to carry out their plan. It is the intention to handle the west side real estate that is owned by the Water Power Company, and any other real estate that comes to invest in, and to put up such buildings (either business houses or residences) as there may be a demand for. This company will be an important factor in the growth of this town. Mr. Castellan, the president, will be in Little Falls in about a week. Settle Within 20 Days.
