Nearly every state in the Union showed a decrease in the number of newspapers published during the past year.

With a few thousand Coxeyites trying to steal trains on the western end of the Northern Pacific, and the strikers and sympathizers delaying trains on the Great Northern, railroad managers are not just the most happy people on earth.

The Washington dispatches now state that another compromise tariff bill will take the place of the present patched up Wilson bill before the senate, and that the new one will have the united support of all Democratic members. Can it be that the approach of the several divisions of Coxey's army will get congress to take some action.

The ever progressive Pioneer Press has made another stride forward and reduced its price from five to two cents. The other Twin City dailies will have to do the same or be left far in the rear. It was the first paper in the northwest to put in type setting machines and come out with a new dress every morning.

O. D. Kinney of Ely and C. A. Towne of Duluth are in the field for Republican congressional nomination. It is said there will be a hard fight for the St. Louis county delegation. The St. Cloud Journal Press and other papers suggest that Hon. Wm. E. Lee of Long Prairie be nominated, and such a result would be very satisfactory to the people of this vicinity.

The necessity for a National Bureau of Public Health is very generally conceded. The discussion over the bill now before Congress creating such a bureau is certain to attract attention to the article on "A National Health Bureau" that appears in the May number of the North American Review by the Surgeon General of the Army, George M. Sternberg, whose official position gives additional weight to his opinions on this question.

Should the State Aid the Unemployed? The two sharp articles by Dr. Coit and Mr. Means take up this subject thoroughly. The discussion bears on the whole large subject of what constitutes socialism; where the State's help may begin, if it begin at all, and where it may end. This is one of the most interesting of the series of discussions of current plans for working social reforms that is now appearing in The Transcript.

A JUST VERDICT.
 The verdict of guilty in the case of the state vs. John Welter was fully warranted by the evidence, and the murderous wretch will spend the balance of his days in state prison. Although the evidence was necessarily all circumstantial, as there was no witness present, the chain of events were so closely connected, that together they convinced the jury that Welter committed the crime. The facts were shown that Welter was the last man seen with Kosanke on the evening of Dec. 1; that soon after they were seen together Welter was about the saloons of the city spending peculiar money that had been saved by Kosanke; Welter spent more money than he could account for, even accepting his claim that Kosanke gave him the coins; he offered for sale in two disreputable resorts Kosanke's watch; blood was found on his clothing and under his finger nails; he knew that Kosanke expected a considerable sum of money that day. Those facts were all shown and convinced the jury that he was guilty.

Juries do not like to hang men on circumstantial evidence, and their recommendation of mercy had the effect of securing a commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment. The judge so sentenced him, and the verdict and sentence meet public approval.

The case was ably tried on both sides, County Attorney Lyon presenting the state's evidence so as to closely link all the parts of the many circumstances into a chain of proof that left no reasonable doubt of the truth of the charge against the prisoner. His plea was an able one, and his conduct of the case reflects great credit upon him.

In J. H. Rhodes and D. T. Calhoun the prisoner had as able counsel as ever appeared before this court, but no efforts could break down the effect of the convincing evidence against their client. Mr. Rhodes never made a better plea than was the one in which he presented his side of the case to the jury, but his case was lost because the evidence as a whole would not sustain his claims.

STILL AFTER IT.
J. C. Flynn Appeals to the Court to Make Him an Alderman Again.
 He Doesn't Think the City Council Were Right in Favoring Butler.

An order has been issued by Judge Searle for the Little Falls city council to show cause on Saturday afternoon, May 5, at chambers in St. Cloud, why they should not certify to his court the records on which W. A. Butler was declared entitled to his seat after the council had once attempted to give it to J. C. Flynn. The papers were signed by Judge Searle Wednesday, and are directed to the city council. J. H. Rhodes, city attorney, is acting for J. C. Flynn in the matter. The matter will attract considerable interest to citizens of the Second ward, as the dispute is over the title to one of the seats on the council from that ward. Unhappily the people of that ward have no voice in this matter, although they are the ones interested. It is sad that such a laudable ambition as to represent the people of the Second ward should be so hard to gratify as it is with Mr. Flynn, and his disappointment at the present situation is to be regretted. The voters of that ward are contented the way the matter now stands, and there is probably not another man in the ward who would try to obtain a seat by the means now employed by J. C. Flynn.


