

WHEELS TURNING.

Trains Again Running Regularly on the Entire Great Northern System.

OLD EMPLOYEES RETURN TO WORK.

Great Enthusiasm All Along the Line Over the Settlement of the Trouble.

St. Paul, May 3.—Already the Great Northern strike has become a mere matter of history. The whistles are blowing and the wheels are rumbling again from the head of the lakes to the Pacific coast as though nothing had happened.

President Hill and President Debs made the same remark when asked for the news. "Everything is all right," they said. All trains are running as before the strike.

STRIKERS JUBILANT.

News of the Settlement Received With Satisfaction at St. Cloud.

St. Cloud, Minn., May 3.—News of the Great Northern strike adjustment was received with great satisfaction by everybody in St. Cloud.

The first news that the great strike was near its end was received here shortly after 7 p. m. at the Great Northern dispatcher's office.

Four freight trains went west and two east up to Wednesday evening. DEMONSTRATION AT GRAND FORKS.

Chinese Banned Out.

PORTLAND, Or., May 3.—United States District Judge Bellinger has ruled on the case of Leo Ling, seeking admission into the United States, that all Chinese who had left this country after the McCreary bill was passed should have taken the precaution to observe all the requirements of that law.

Kansas Wind Storm.

EBRON, Kan., May 3.—A very heavy wind and hail storm did great damage here. The United Brethren church was blown down and wrecked.

Agricultural Appropriation Bill. WASHINGTON, May 3.—The agricultural appropriation bill reported to the house by Chairman Hatch of the committee on agriculture, appropriates \$3,180,648 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1895.

Nine Villages Destroyed.

ATHENS, Ga., May 3.—It is learned that during the earthquake shocks of Friday last nine villages in the island of Euboea were destroyed.

Sickles Appointed Receiver. NEW YORK, May 3.—David B. Sickles has been appointed temporary receiver of the Harlem River bank.

Immense Saw Mills Burned. TOULON, May 3.—The enormous saw mills at Mourillon have been burned. The fire did damage to the amount of \$1,250,000.

Railroad Shops Burned. ATLANTA, Ga., May 3.—A special to The Constitution reports the destruction by fire of the Marietta and North Georgia railroad shops at Marietta.

Caused a Loss of \$200,000. ALBANY, N. Y., May 3.—Kenwood, a suburb of Albany, was the scene of a conflagration which destroyed the Kenwood felt mills, three dwelling houses and a grocery store.

Rescued at Sea. LONDON, May 3.—The British steamer Nessmore, Captain Hargreaves, from Boston, has arrived at Gravesend, having on board the crew of the German ship Cleopatra, abandoned on April 22.

Earthquake Shock in Wales. CARDIFF, May 3.—A sharp shock of earthquake was felt through this district during the day.

Steamship Explodes. PHILADELPHIA, May 3.—A six-inch steamship in the plant of the Southern Electric company exploded, killing one man and injuring three others.

Colorado Miners Strike. TRINIDAD, Colo., May 3.—The coal miners at Engelville have struck. The strike was inaugurated by several of the miners sending out coal which contained a great deal of dirt.

To Stop Extradition Proceedings. PARIS, May 3.—The court has confirmed an agreement with which the executors of Baron de Reinach will pay 1,650,000 francs and Dr. Cornelius Hertz 1,500,000 francs to the liquidators of the Panama Canal company.

CLEVELAND RIOTS.

Demonstrations of Unemployed Culminate in Several Bloody Conflicts.

MANY OF THE RIOTERS INJURED.

Five Hundred Militia Under Arms to Respond in Case of Necessity.

CLEVELAND, May 3.—The disorders which began Monday with the May day demonstration of the unemployed, culminated during the day in open riots. There were three separate and bloody conflicts between the police and the rioters, and troops are now under arms ready to respond to call in case of an emergency.

Induced to Quit Work before the officers arrived. When the police came upon the scene the men made a stand and hurled bricks and stones at the officers.

Scattering the Rioters in all directions. In the south end of the city at the same time a mob of 500 men drove away the workmen from the United States Salt works.

Mayor Blee has issued a proclamation calling on the people not to assemble on the streets. At the same time he called upon the militia to assemble in their armories and await his call.

COXEY ARRESTED.

The Chief of the Industrials Jailed at Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Jacob Schleser Coxe, the chief of the Coxe army, is under arrest, and the three leaders of the movement which culminated at the capitol grounds Tuesday, will have to answer to the courts for the part they took in Tuesday's disturbance.

PROVISIONS SCARCE.

The Outlook for Kelly's Army Decidedly Unpromising.

DES MOINES, May 3.—The outlook for Kelly's army is decidedly unpromising, and the industrials are in anything but good humor. All hope of securing a train is practically abandoned by the local committees.

Horses Incinerated.

GRAND FORKS, N. D., May 3.—J. Fan's livery barn and residence in East Grand Forks were entirely destroyed by fire during the night.

NEW YORK, May 3.—The weather has become suddenly warm, the temperature at noon having been 90 in the shade. One prostration by heat is reported.
