

DROWNED.

Three Paper Makers are Lost in Lake Winnebago Sunday.

Cragin and Hutton Formerly Worked at the Hennepin Mills.

About 7 o'clock Monday evening the noble grand of the Little Falls Odd Fellows lodge received a telegram from the noble grand of the lodge at Menasha, Wis., to the effect that Charles Cragin, a member of the order, had been drowned at that place and that the body had been recovered. Steps were immediately taken by the lodge relative to the disposition of the body and it will probably be sent to his former home at Lawrence, Mass.

Charles Cragin came here about two years ago and was employed at the Hennepin Paper mill until about the first of April when he left, intending to go to California, but finally secured a position in the Howard mill at Menasha. He was a man about thirty years of age, quiet and a gentleman in every particular. The deceased had been a member of the Odd Fellows lodge for over a year and shortly before leaving became a member of the Knights of Pythias.

Geo. Wingrove, a beater engineer at the Hennepin Paper mill received a message yesterday afternoon relating that his brother, who was working in the same mill with Cragin, had been killed. He left on the morning train for Menasha.

A later special from Menasha says: Charles Cragin, John Hutton and William Wingrove were drowned on Lake Winnebago, while fishing.

It is stated that John Hutton was also employed at the Hennepin mills in this city a short time ago. The supposition is that they were caught in a gale which overturned the boat. Cragin could not swim.

J. C. Parker left a will, disposing of all his property, real and personal, to his wife absolutely, empowering her to dispose of it at pleasure. The will further provides that from any of his estate remaining at the death of his wife, his step daughters, Mrs. Ward and Miss Wolford, shall receive \$2,000 each, the balance to be divided equally among his brothers and sisters. His life was insured for \$3,000 for the benefit of his wife. The value of the estate is yet to be determined by appraisers soon to be selected. C. M. Sprague and the widow are named as executors in the will, but Mrs. Parker declines to accept the trust and pays the probate court to substitute M. F. Woodbury.—Sank Centre Herald.
