State Normal Schools

WINONA, MANKATO, ST. CLOUD AND MOORHEAD. These schools are organized for the training of teachers for the public schools of the state. ORGANIZATION.—Each school comprises two departments—the Normal department and the Training department or Model school. The Normal department embraces: a. An Elementary course for teachers of rural districts and elementary grades. b. An Advanced course for teachers of advanced grades. c.
