The complaint the Transcript made last spring was that after the city council canvassed the votes as returned by the judges of election, it refused to declare the result and give the certificate of election to the party receiving the largest number of votes. It was the unlawful act of attempting to make the party who was returned as elected the contestant that was denounced, and if the county board this fall had refused to declare Goulet elected, when the returns indicated that he was, neither the Transcript or any other just critic could have defended them. An election contest isn't a matter for any paper to get excited over, but a refusal to give a man a certificate of election when he is entitled to it is an outrage. The man appearing to have the most votes is entitled to his certificate of election, and the other has a perfect right to make a contest in the courts. The Transcript has never taken any other grounds, and if the Democrat had any memory it would not criticize the Transcript in that matter.
