For the past few weeks beef has been as dear in some parts of this country as it is in Europe. It is lamentable that this should be so, whatever the cause. If America, with all its liberty and millions of unoccupied square miles, cannot give mankind a better chance for life than Europe has done, then it would have been just as well if Columbus had never discovered America.

If it should not, the laborer in America will be no whit better off than he would be in England or Germany. His family will have to bestir itself to find as far as possible substitutes for meat. In Europe the principal substitute is cheese. There are more than 100 different cheeses known to the English, French and Germans. Cheese at its best is as nourishing as meat and almost as palatable. It is not so digestible, but by careful selection a good article can be found even in this land of cheating and filled cheese. If our cheesemakers were as honest and skillful as they should be, a meat famine would have far less terror for the American people than it now has. And as it is those who during the present scarcity fall back on first class cheese as a substitute for meat will find it, like Weller's tripe, "fillin for the money."

The state of Georgia owns a railroad. It is called the Northeastern road. Governor Atkinson bid it for the state for \$100,000. Now we shall see what state ownership of a railroad will do.

Although the United States produces more than 153,000,000 tons of coal a year, she is still only the second coal country in the world, Great Britain standing first. But wait till our southern mines are fully developed.

The sooner the many railroads adjust freight rates equitably and honestly and harmoniously the sooner they will get out of the hands of receivers.
