Minneapolis Lumberman: It was reported last week that the Weyerhaeuser syndicate had made a sale of a million dollars worth of pine to Chicago parties, but the report is denied by Mr. Frederick Weyerhaeuser, and it is to be presumed that he has inside information on the subject. He says he has been negotiating with some parties for the sale of some pine, but as much as the reports indicated, and that the deal has not been closed. In view of the present condition of the log and lumber market, Mr. Weyerhaeuser says he prefers to buy rather than to sell timber.

Against "White Water" Boys.

Minneapolis Lumberman: The legislature of the state of Maine has passed a bill forbidding the wearing of spiked shoes or boots in public places, and imposing a heavy fine for violation of the law. "This has been hailed with delight by the railroad companies, and the proprietors of hotels and bar-rooms," says the report. We have heard of locking the stable door after the horse had been removed. Log drivers have been punching their shoe spikes into Maine floors for a hundred years or more, and it is only now that they are to be officially denied that privilege. Incidentally it might be mentioned that is generally understood that there are no bar-rooms in Maine. It is also stated that the Wisconsin legislature has been considering a bill to prevent women from wearing corsets. Dress reform must be gaining ground when the law takes up these matters.

MORE AID FOR OTIS

Six Regiments of Regulars to Reinforce Our Troops Now In the Philippines.

Orders Issued to Proceed at Once to San Francisco and Thence to Manila.

VOLUNTEERS MAY RETURN

If Conditions Are Found Satisfactory Their Services Will Not Be Necessary.

Another Request From Admiral Dewey for Vessels of Light Draught

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The secretary of war has ordered the reinforcement of General Otis by six regiments. These are the Sixth infantry now at San Antonio, the Sixth artillery scattered along the Atlantic coast stations, the Ninth infantry at Madison Barracks, Thirtieth infantry in New York state, Twenty-first infantry at Plattsburg, N. Y., and the Sixteenth infantry at Fort Crook and neighboring points in the Middle West. These regiments have been ordered to make ready to proceed to San Francisco and thence to Manila.

In answer to the direct question as to whether or not these regular troops are intended to relieve a corresponding number of volunteer soldiers at Manila it was said at the war department that while this probably would be the case it was not possibly yet to make a positive statement.

Depends on Existing Conditions.

This means that if when the reinforcements arrive at Manila the conditions are satisfactory the volunteers will be brought home, but if Otis shall have need for all of the combined force then they must wait.

The reinforcements are made up of troops who are not only regulars in the full sense of the term, but who have been through the Cuban or Porto Rican campaigns. They know what it is to be under fire, how to hunt Indians and also how to fight in tropical jungles. With them replacing the same number of volunteers General Otis will have a majority of regulars in his command, something the war department has earnestly desired to bring about at the earliest possible moment. The position of the American commander at Manila also will be safeguarded against the effect of a sudden and forced discharge of volunteers by the ratification of the peace treaty.

NEEDS MORE SMALL CRAFT

Gunboat Vison Ordered to Join Dewey's Squadron.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Admiral Dewey is again pressing on the navy department the urgent need of vessels of light draught as a means of communication among the numerous small islands of the Philippine group. To this end the gunboat Vison, which figured bravely for a vessel of her light calibre at the outset of the Cuban campaign, has been ordered to be immediately fitted out at the Norfolk navy yard for sailing for Manila. This will take about a month and it probably will be three or four months before she joins Dewey's fleet. Besides the Concord, which is perhaps a little too large to be classified as one of the small craft, the only light vessels now in the Philippines available for running about those waters are the Petrel and the Helena. The Castine and Princeton, however, are now speeding in that direction, but the small craft equipment there will still be inadequate.

Sherman Making Good Time.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The troop transport Sherman, carrying the entire Third regiment of regulars and one battalion of the Seventeenth infantry, has arrived at Ferin, en route to Manila, with reinforcements. Ferin is on the Egyptian side of the Red sea, just above the southern outlet, and is a British naval station. The Sherman should reach Manila about March 15. She is outfitting the Grant, which preceded her by two weeks.

The Relief Sails for Manila.

New York, March 3.—The United States hospital ship Relief has sailed for Manila. She is in command of Surgeon Major Bradley and will carry to General Otis for the relief of the sick and wounded at Manila a full cargo of medical supplies and delicacies, as well as 200 medical corps men and a number of acting assistant surgeons and hospital stewards.

Wash Over to the Whaling.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 3.—It is reported that the American gunboat Wheeling, now in port, has received rush instructions from Washington to proceed to Manila. The Wheeling has just returned from a long cruise to Alaska ports.

Hobson's Great Advance.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The president's promotion of Hobson is said by naval officers to constitute the greatest material promotion as a recognition of gallantry in the history of the naval service. It will make Hobson a captain at the age of 30, and amounts to 350 numbers in the line of the navy; Hobson gains 26 years in the ordinary course of promotion.
