—Minnesota cattle shippers lost several thousand dollars by the failure of a Sioux City commission firm.

Frederick Driscoll, for many years business manager of the Pioneer Press, is now commissioner to look after the labor interests of the American Newspaper Publishers' association. His work will be to maintain friendly relations between the newspapers and their employes, and to prevent strikes or disagreements.

The United States is rapidly becoming a "creditor nation." With the prosperity brought about through a system of protective tariff and a declaration for sound money, has come an enormous reduction in our indebtedness abroad, and now our business men are actually loaning money to other parts of the world. A \$25,000,000 loan has just been made by New York capitalists to Russia. One especially interesting feature of this is the fact that much of the money is to be expended in the United States for the purchase of coal, agricultural machinery, railway cars and rails, and other products of labor which are to be sent to Russia, \$2,000,000 being placed in St. Louis for the purchase of cars; another million dollars in Chicago for agricultural implements, and still more in Pennsylvania for railway engines and materials, thus benefiting labor in the United States as well as capital. In addition to this actual loan, it is asserted that United States financiers offered to take the entire loan which the British government recently put upon the market.

Continued Colonist Movement.

Minneapolis Times: The Northern Pacific coast train went out of the Twin Cities last evening in two long sections. In addition to an unusually crowded regular, four colonist sleepers were attached, each taxed to its utmost capacity. The colonist were bound for Montana and states farther west. The Great Northern reported a heavy day's business also, it being estimated at the general offices that 150 people went out last night, and possibly 200 more were expected to go today. Reduced rates were withdrawn yesterday at all points in eastern territory. As a result, the ensuing two or three days will sweep a heavy tide westward. This season's business, as spoken of by the three coast lines, surpasses that for many years past.

Another Northern Minnesota R. R.

Articles of incorporation for a new railroad, to be known as the Fargo Duluth & Northwestern, have been sent to the secretary of state. It is proposed to build first south-east from Fargo to intercept the Soo line about Elbow Lake, Minn., after which the line will be extended northwest from Fargo connecting ultimately with the Soo in the northwestern part of the state. Plans are being developed for a line by the same company from Fargo to Duluth. The incorporators are giving out little information, but it is asserted that after the right of way is secured the Soo will assume the management of the line and market long projected extension to Fargo.

WORK FOR 4,000 MEN

Employment Agents at Minneapolis Have Plenty of Spring Orders for Men.

Minneapolis Journal: This period is what the employment bureau managers call "between the seasons." It is almost impossible to get a lumberman to pay the fare of a laborer to the camps now, for the work there will not last more than a few weeks at the most, and the weather may suddenly terminate it any day. The railroad contractors would be glad if someone would devise some means by which they could make arrangements for their spring's work in the winter. But unfortunately they must wait until the thaw comes and then their business will be done with a rush.

One Minneapolis agent estimated this morning, that although his orders were a little indefinite just now, he would be able to place 1,500 men between April 10 and the middle of May. One order by a single firm calls for 1,000 men, and it will probably be able to use more. The approximate number that will be given new jobs by Minneapolis firms during the next two months is conservative estimated at 4,000. Less than a hundred men are in Minneapolis now waiting these spring openings.

STOCK RAISING IN CROW WING.

Big Ranch Purchased and Fine Stock to Be Imported—Near Daggett Brook.

Brainerd, Minn., March 20.—Stock raising will be tried on a Daggett Brook farm the coming spring on an extensive scale. Parties whose names are not announced have purchased 1,100 acres of railroad lands and with importations of blooded animals from the southern and central sections of the state propose to establish a large ranch. This region is particularly suited for stock feeding from the abundance with which natural grasses grow.
