A LIE.
We have just heard that our country subscribers were expecting to find in our last issue, an announcement that we had discontinued the publication of the *Volunteer*. We do not know who started the report, but we are confident it was not a friend, and we may have some enemies. Whoever it was, however, is a lying, sneaking, cowardly villain, and dares not come up in an open and aboveboard way and satisfy his malicious revenge, but like the craven puppy that he is, goes sneaking around the country seeking to injure our business. The report is entirely untrue. We do not know who the individual is to whom we refer, but probably many who will read this does; is such a liar, and one who would stoop to such a dastardly trick to injure one against whom he holds an enmity.

GAME LAW.—Next Friday the restriction placed upon shooting Prairie Chickens by the game law, expires. After that we expect to see the sporting men pitching in, and the market filled with chickens, as they are unusually plenty this year.

LUCK.—Our much esteemed fellow townsman, H. L. Bovens Esq., has lately received notice of his appointment as paymaster for this state. We believe his appointment was secured through the efforts of Col. Aldrich. Good for you, Henry. Now go in on your nerve and scatter the "green backs."

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—Rev. Mr. Bowditch says that, as he was coming home from the County Line last week, he saw, about a mile above Benj. Bevers' farm, six telegraph poles that had been struck by lightning. Some of them were split and shattered, and others only knocked down.

PERSONAL.—The Hon. T. L. Adams has returned home from a prolonged visit to the Third Regiment. We meant to have noticed his arrival last week, but in the pressure of business it escaped our memory until after the forms were on the press. We hope Mr. Adams will pardon the unintentional neglect. He left the regiment just in time to save himself from being captured, which we understand was the occasion of great mortification among the rebels, who confidently expected to capture him. He is one of those soldiers who believes in the old and true saying, "he who fights and runs away will live to fight another day."

CROSS.—We hear from all parts of the state, and particularly from this county, the most encouraging reports about the new crops. It is expected that it will equal, if not surpass the crop of two years ago. We hope it will, and that it will command high prices; our farmers need all the encouragement in that direction they can get to help out the government tax.

RETURNED.—Wm. Sexton Esq., a member of the State Shooters company from this state and a victim of this county, returned home having been disabled by the collision of two trains of cars. He had his left leg and left arm broken by the accident, besides receiving several severe bruises on his head. He says the boys were almost ready to mutiny when Gov. Ramsey appointed a second Lieutenant and sent him off down there to command a company of men, every one of whom was better qualified for the position than he. The company to a man was in favor of their own noble fellow citizen, Alva Wright, who is in every way qualified for the office, and is a general favorite with the company. The boys told him that he had only to say the word and they would make the camp too hot for the Governor's pet; but Alva was a peaceful citizen and a good soldier, so he told them to keep their tempers. Politics has nearly ruined the country, and we greatly fear it will ruin the army.

J. E. Chapman has received a commission to recruit for the Sixth Regiment. He is just the man for the business, and we have no doubt will be quite successful. Success to you, Captain.—*Hastings County.*
Mr. Chapman was but lately a citizen of our county, and resided at Cannon Falls. He has frequently attended our county conventions as a delegate from that place. We have long known him. A way back in the old Granite State we formed an acquaintance that was both pleasant and profitable on our part, and which was renewed here in Minnesota with, we trust, mutual pleasure.—During all our long acquaintance with him we have never heard a word spoken by any person derogatory to his character as an honorable man, and a christian gentleman.

The Proof.—Patrick Healy, Esq., residing a few miles from Morristown, in this county, brought his clipping of wool to this place, a few days ago, and sold it to C. W. Brackett Esq., realizing for the fleece of 200 sheep the snug little sum of \$325. A few days afterwards Mr. Healy called at our office on his return from Hastings, where he had been with some three loads of wheat, and in conversation stated that it cost him more to raise the wheat, which he had just sold for something like \$50, than it did to grow the wool, for which he received \$325. Mr. Healy is a thorough going practical farmer, one who understands his business, and his testimony is entirely reliable. Why is it that more of our farmers for King Wood? WHEAT.—There is almost a perfect quiet in the grain business on our streets now, occasioned principally by farmers being so busy in the harvest field that they cannot come to market; and probably to some extent by the fact that the old wheat is nearly all sold off. Buyers are offering for No. 1, 70 cents, and for No. 2, 66 cents. Lately there has been a poor quality of wheat offered—slightly musty—that has sold much lower.

Common Proceedings.
RED WING, July 22, 1892.
The Council met pursuant to adjournment. Present—The Mayor, Councilors Johnson and Lawlor, and the Clerk. Absent—Councilor McLaren.
Councilor Johnson offered the following resolution which was adopted, to wit:
Resolved, that the City Council appropriate a sum sufficient for turning the water-courses down the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets to Bluff street and down Bluff street to Fifth street, said sum not to exceed fifty dollars, to be expended under the direction of a committee appointed for that purpose, and that said work be done as soon as practicable.

Clerk Williston offered the following resolution, which was adopted, to wit:
Resolved, that the Mayor and Councilor Lawlor be appointed a special committee and instructed to agree with some responsible person or persons upon the terms of contracts for building a road to the City Cemetery grounds, and for the survey of said grounds, said committee to have full power and discretion in all matters embraced in this resolution.
Adjourned to Tuesday, July 29th, 1892, at 7 o'clock P. M.
