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The Agreement for an Exchange of Prisoners.

MAJORS LANCASTER AND JAMES DIX, V. A. A.

The undersigned, having been commissioned by the authorities respectively to make arrangements for a general exchange of prisoners of war, have agreed to the following articles:

Article 1. It is hereby agreed and stipulated that all prisoners of war held by either party, including those taken on private vessels, known as privateers, shall be discharged upon the conditions and terms following:

Prisoners to be exchanged man for man and officer for officer; privates to be placed on the footing of officers and men of the navy.

Men and officers of the lower grade may be exchanged for officers of higher grade, and men and officers of different services may be exchanged according to the following scale of equivalents:

A general commander in chief or an admiral shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or forty-six privates or common seamen.

A flag officer or major general shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or forty privates or common seamen.

A commodore carrying a broad pennant, or a brigadier general, shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or twenty privates or common seamen.

A captain in the navy or a colonel, shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or for fifteen privates or common seamen.

A lieutenant colonel or a commander in the navy shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or for ten privates or common seamen.

A lieutenant or a master in the navy or a captain in the army or militia, shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or six privates or common seamen.

A lieutenant or a master in the navy or a captain in the army or militia, shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or six privates or common seamen.

Master's mates in the navy, or lieutenants and engineers in the army, shall be exchanged for officers of equal rank, or four privates or common seamen.

Midshipmen, warrant officers in the navy, masters of merchant vessels, and commissioned officers of equal rank, or three privates or common seamen.

Captains, lieutenants or mates of merchant vessels or privateers, and all petty officers in the navy, and all non-commissioned officers in the army or militia shall be severally exchanged for persons of equal rank, or for two privates or common seamen; and private soldiers and common seamen shall be exchanged for each other, man for man.

Article 2. Local, State, civil and military rank held by persons not in actual military service, will not be recognized, the basis of exchange being the grade actually held in the naval and military service of the respective parties.

Article 3. If citizens held by either party on charge of disloyalty or any alleged civil offense are exchanged, it shall only be for citizens, captured soldiers, teamsters and all civilians in the actual service of either party to be exchanged for persons in similar position.

Article 4. All persons of war to be discharged on parole in ten days after their capture, and the prisoners now held and those hereafter to be transported to the points mutually agreed upon at the expense of the capturing party. The surplus prisoners not exchanged shall not be permitted to take up arms again, nor to serve as military police or constabulary force in a city, garrison, or field work held by either of the respective parties, nor as guards of prisoners, depots or stores, nor to discharge any duty usually performed by soldiers, until exchanged under the provisions of this article. The exchange is not to be considered complete until the officer or soldier exchanged for has been actually returned to the lines to which he belongs.

Article 5. Each party, upon the discharge of prisoners of the other party, is authorized to discharge an equal number of their own officers and men as the party may choose.

The lists thus mutually furnished will keep both parties advised of the true condition of the exchanges of prisoners.

Article 6. The stipulations and provisions above mentioned to be of binding obligation during the continuance of the war, it matters not which party may have the surplus of prisoners, the great principle involving being:

1. An equitable exchange of prisoners, man for man, officer for officer, or officers of higher grade exchanged for officers of lower grade or for privates, according to the scale of equivalents.

2. That privates and officers and men of different services may be exchanged according to the same rule of equivalents.

3. That all prisoners, of whatsoever arm of service, are to be exchanged or paroled in ten days from the time of their capture, if it be practicable to transfer them to their own lines in that time; if not, as soon thereafter as practicable.

4. That no officer, soldier or employee in the service of either party is to be considered exchanged and absolved from his parole until his equivalent has actually reached the line of his friends.

5. That the parole forbids the prisoners of field, garrison, police or guard or constabulary duty.
