FRONTIER REPROVES.—The Indian outbreak on our frontier has, over and over the murders, arson and horrors there enacted, driven away the once prosperous inhabitants of that fertile region, and cast thousands upon thousands of them, penniless and homeless upon the charity of the people of the more secure parts of the States. Several families of them arrived in this city last week, and are now temporarily located at the Gray Hotel, building, at the foot of Broad Street. Two months ago they were in affluent circumstances, now they are in want. Such are the changes of life, and from them none of us are exempt. We are none of us rich, but from the little we have we can say of us give a little to those who have nothing. Any article of food or clothing that may be bestowed by any charitably disposed person, will, we presume, be gladly received. Now is a chance to do good, and where one offers himself it ought always to be improved.

TOWN SUPERVISORS.—It is the duty of Town Clerks to give notice of the election. In some election districts, as for instance in Red Wing, the Town Clerk's office has become vacant by the officer having enlisted. Immediate steps ought to be taken to fill the vacancy. Section one of article seven, of an act to provide for township organizations provides, that in case of a vacancy occurring in any town office, the Justices of the Peace together with the Supervisors of the town may fill the vacancy. There is no time to be lost. Let it be attended to.

TOWN CLERKS ATTENTION!—By section 4 of an act providing for elections, approved March 12th, 1861, it is made the duty of the several Town Clerks in the State, at least fifteen days before a general election, to give public notice thereof, by posting three written or printed notices in the election district, containing a list of the officers to be voted for, one of which notices shall be posted up at the place of election.

The notices may be substantially in the following form, viz: "Notice is hereby given that on the day of 1862, at the election district composed of the township of _____ in the county of Goodhue, an election will be held on the 9th day of _____ at _____ o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, which election will be held for the purpose of electing one Register of Deeds, one County Auditor, to fill vacancy and for full term, one Sheriff, one County Attorney, one Clerk of the Court to fill vacancy, one County Surveyor, one County Coroner one Judge of Probate and Court Commissioner and two Representatives.

Republican Platform.

RESOLVED, That we hereby submit to the candid consideration of all the electors of this State the following platform of principles and opinions: First—That the present war with all its carnage, bloodshed and suffering which has followed since its commencement is properly and directly chargeable to a wicked and ambitious band of slaveholding secessionists and conspirators of the South; that having been defeated in the Presidential Election which they foolishly participated, they formed the desperate resolution that rather than submit peacefully to the will of the nation as deliberately and constitutionally expressed through the ballot-box, to surrender the bonds holding the Union together and rend in fragments the most liberal and splendid fabric of free government in existence; they wilfully kindled the fires of civil strife by the disgraceful and cruel bombardment of Fort Sumter, and unless we take measures to defend our government and its institutions to the full extent of our resources and to the last extremity, we shall be justly liable to incur the scorn and contempt of all nations and the reproach of successful secessionists.

Second—That we are proud to proclaim that the war upon our part is prosecuted from motives of patriotism and giving strength to these great objects we promptly declare our willingness to sustain and uphold the present Administration and its policy, and we hereby heartily and most cordially invite the loyal and patriotic men of all parties and persuasions to unite and co-operate with us in giving to the general Government our undivided sympathy and support.

FOURTH—That we endorse the National Administration, and we have the strongest confidence in the wisdom, integrity and patriotism of Abraham Lincoln—that we most cordially approve all his efforts to preserve the Union and destroy the workings and plottings of treason, and that we can safely pledge him the constant adherence of every patriot in Minnesota.

FIFTH—That we congratulate the whole country, and especially the State of Minnesota upon the final passage of a wise and liberal Homestead Bill, by which Free Homes will be opened to thousands in limited circumstances, and that it is well worthy of remembrance that this beneficent measure along with the Pacific Railroad project—often defeated under former Administrations—has by the first time been made laws under the Administration of Abraham Lincoln.

SIXTH—That we should regard with the deepest indignation all attempts in secession in our domestic troubles, by England or any other foreign power, and should such an event actually occur, we can vouch that our last man capable of bearing arms would be ready to die in the defense of our beloved land.

SEVENTH—That the sincere and warmest sympathies of the Nation are due to our gallant and heroic soldiers who have with valor and peril their lives in defense of the Union; and that we rejoice to know that their acts of devotion and valor will always illustrate the most brilliant page of our military annals.

EIGHTH—That we hereby emphatically condemn the late Confession Act of Congress, believing it right, and a proper vindication of retributive justice, that the property of rebels, traitors and assassins, who are aiming at the destruction of our Government, should be used in sustaining and strengthening the Grand Army of the Union.


