Patriotic Resolutions.

We commend the following resolutions which were passed by the Mass Convention that met in Red Wing, on the 30th ult., to the candid attention of all our readers. If they are the words of "truth and sobriety" set upon them. If the sentiment is false, reject them:

Whereas the distressed state of the country demands the unity of all the people in sentiment and action, and

Whereas it appears to us that such unity cannot exist while the people are divided on questions of minor and local importance.

Therefore Resolved, That we, the citizens of Goodhue County, in Mass Convention assembled, will drop all party issues, and party quarrels, and nominate and vote for the best men in the County for office, without the least reference to their past or present political associations. We only ask: "Is he loyal to the Constitution, is he devoted to the Union?"

Resolved, That we will sustain the Administration in the prosecution of the war, and will stand by the President and by the Generals in the field until every vestige of the present rebellion is crushed out, and peace restored to the country.

The resolutions were adopted unanimously.

WHEAT MARKET.—Wheat has declined to the low figures, 58 cents per bushel. The cause of the decline is a superfluity of the article in the East, small means of transportation, and a rise in Lake freights.—Wheat will not again this fall, reach the high price it has been commanding. Considerable is being brought in, but there is not at present much disposition either to buy or to sell.

BRING IT BACK.—We would be greatly obliged to the individual who carried away the Republican of October third from this office, if he would bring it back. We are keeping a file of that paper, and intend to preserve it as a specimen of choice literature, and political consistency, as a contribution to a World's Museum.

SCHOOL LAND SALE.—The State Auditor has just closed a sale of the School lands in this county. The sale has been larger than in almost any other county in the State where School lands have offered.

By what authority, and by what sort of reasoning does that bigoted candidate for office who edits the Republic, assume that because we do not announce who we shall vote for, that we intend to vote in any particular way? or does he risk a lie for the sake of the effect of the lie?

BUSH STREET.—We are glad to be able to announce that the work on Bush street is progressing. Wm. H. Bennett is filling in the dirt on the culvert first, but must soon stop, for the reason that the culvert has never been finished. What a pity! The city ought to compel the property owners on that street to finish up the grading.—Why has it been permitted to hang along until now?

BUSINESS.—To acquire an idea of the amount of business carried on in the State of Minnesota, one has only to take a short trip on one of the boats. At every point on the river the levees are crowded with freight, wheat and flour mostly, waiting transportation. Every boat that comes up is loaded down to the guards with freight, besides which almost every one has from one to three barges nearly as large as a small steambarge, also loaded down.

At no point on the river, between Red Wing and St. Paul, did we see as much indication of business as at this place. On our levee, last Saturday night, was piled not less than thirty car loads of wheat, and the warehouses were also full. During the day (any day) our streets are crowded with teams, so that it takes considerable skill to navigate a team through successfully. It is no uncommon occurrence to see two lines of loaded teams extending from Main street to the warehouses, each team waiting patiently its turn to be unloaded. At this rate the capacity of the place to take care of the grain that finds a market here will soon be inadequate.

PERSONAL.—We are happy to announce the return of Lieut. Willett W. DeKay. He belongs to the Third Regiment, but is one of those who bravely and nobly voted and protested against surrendering. Deacon was in favor of fighting. Also Lieutenant Edward L. Baker, of the same regiment, who likewise voted against a surrender.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
