**LECTURE.**—Prof. Powers will lecture at Hamline University this evening on Physiology.

**SNOW STORM.**—We hardly think it necessary to mention the Snow Storm as a matter of news, but as a "local item" it is somewhat "hefty," and ought not to be overlooked. On the 15th inst., we were favored with a very modest little storm of about one foot of snow, which by the warm days that followed was so tied down to about half that depth. About noon of Christmas day, it renewed this attack and, up to this date, (Monday night) has not "letten back." We now have about two feet of snow, on a level, and wind enough to raise it in certain localities to thrice that altitude.

The St. Peter *Statesman*, which, since the Indian raid of 1862 has been suspended, has made its appearance again. We wish them much success. The *Statesman*, although sharing no sentiment with us politically, is a good *local* paper, and one that ought, especially for that reason, to be sustained.

**LECTURES.**—Prof. C. S. Powers closed his course of lectures on *Cerebral Physiology*, on Tuesday evening last. He had crowded audiences during the week he was with us—a remarkably attractive speaker—sound and logical in his reasoning—practical in his illustrations, and appears to have made himself thoroughly master of the various subjects he discusses. Those evenings afforded a rich entertainment to all who attended—and a means by which all may be profited, who will take the time and trouble to think on the subject of the lectures.—*Life City Times.*

Prof. Powers commenced a course of lectures here on Saturday evening under the most auspicious circumstances.—Christmas and New Year festivities engrossing the attention of the people in a great measure, and the snow storm being such as to compel many to stay at home,—notwithstanding which he is meeting with wonderful success. His first lecture was well attended, and his audience is getting larger as he progresses.

**CONNECTION.**—Last week we stated that Sherry Grove had voted to give one hundred dollars to any person volunteering from that town, in case it should be found her quota had not been filled. We have since been informed that the offer is to give three hundred dollars.

**THANKS.**—The citizens of this city are again under obligations to Mr. Dickinson for scraping away the snow so that it is possible to get around. This should no longer be a personal charge, but the City Council should authorize the Marshal to do it at the public cost.

**INDIAN MASSACRE.**—Mrs. Gibbs has commenced canvassing this city for the sale of the book of the above title. It is a well written book, and abounds in thrilling interest. Mrs. Gibbs wishes us to state that the book can only be had of her. It will not be put into the Book Stores.

**ST. PAUL PRESS.**—We refer our readers to the Prospectus of this splendid Journal which we publish this week. The Press is to Minnesota what the Tribune is to Chicago. It is a fearless advocate of the right in all things, and the best newspaper in the State.

**APPOINTMENT.**—Martin S. Chandler, Sheriff of this county has been appointed a recruiting officer for this County, by the Prevost Marshal.

**RECRUITS.**—This morning 35 recruits left this place for Fort Snelling. They are from Plainview, Wabasha Co., the voters of which have agreed to give the volunteers a bounty of three hundred dollars. This brought them out, for it placed their families above what Ten or more of this number have signed their names to go into the first battery and the balance will probably go into the Cavalry regiment.

**CHRISTMAS.**—Good dinners, Christmas Trees, Presents and Festivals were the order of the day. There was a Christmas Tree at the M. E. Church, and one at the Lutheran Church on the evening of that day. Later in the evening the Presbyterian's had a grand Festival at the Metropolitan Hotel, from the proceeds of which they realized about \$100 dollars, which is to be devoted to the liquidation of the debt on the church. It was a pleasant affair, and the supper was superb. Quite a revival occurred during the day, and it is said Bishop G., confirmed forty four persons as members of his Church. On the evening of the 26th the Presbyterians delighted the members of their Sabbath School by treating them to a host of presents, plucked from their Christmas Tree at Sterling's Hall and Monday evening the Episcopalists did likewise at their church.

**THE BEST CHRISTMAS GIFT.**—What pleasure does either party find in giving presents to those who don't need them?—On the contrary what gratifying emotions does the giver enjoy who bestows his bounties upon the needy. Thousands of dollars worth of trinkets was given away on Christmas day, but we doubt if a single one of the donors experienced the satisfaction that George Wilkinson felt when he hauled a cord of wood to Mrs. Gordon's door and made her a present of it. If our charity could be called out in that way with each recurring anniversary of the birth of the Saviour of mankind, Christmas would be not simply a *holiday*, but a *holy day* to the needy.

**THIRD REGIMENT.**—Lt. Col. Mattson has arrived in the place, having been sent home on recruiting service. His rooms are over Kellogg's Drug Store, opposite the Red Wing House. The Third, and for some time has been comfortably stationed at Little Rock, Ark., doing Provost Guard duty there. The regiment is in a healthy condition, and are pleasantly located. Lt. Col. Mattson says that it is not probable that the Third will be taken away from their present station while it is necessary to keep soldiers in Little Rock; when they are called away, it is certain that they can be mounted if the Regiment desire it. ## 5-20. 5-20. THE UNITED STATES POPULAR 5-20 LOAN.

BANK OF THOMPSON BROTHERS, 21. PAUL, Dec. 10, 1893. The Secretary of the Treasury has not given notice of his intention to withdraw this particular loan from sale at par, and until ten days notice is given the undersigned, as "General Subscribers," will continue to supply the public.
