GRAND SLEIGHING PARTY.—We learn that a project has been inaugurated by some of our pleasure loving citizens, for a grand sleighing party to Hastings, to come off about the 26th of the present month. The Hastings people are making preparation to give the party a hearty welcome, and we have no doubt many will avail themselves of this opportunity for enjoying the excellent sleighing we now have, and the good cheer of the people of Hastings. PUR UP ICE.—We hope last summers experience in the want of ice, will be sufficient and our citizens will not incur the risk of another such experience. Nearly all of last summer, all the ice used in this city was hauled from Lake City, when, had it not been for gross negligence on our part we might have had plenty of it at home.—Well, the season for picking up ice has come around again, and the stock is good—never was better—now we hope to see the article put up, and enough to last us through.

FROZEN.—On the 1st inst, Hans Golden of Belvidere in this county, froze his hands and face badly. His hands are frozen up above his wrist. Dr. Hawley is attending the case, and has hopes that he will be able to save the boy without amputation.

Rev. Timothy Jewett on his way to town to meet with the County Board of which he is a member, froze his face severely, though not dangerously.

JUNOS RESOLVE!—The petition presented to the Board of Commissioners by the members of Red Wing Bar, asking that chairs be provided for the Jury, in place of the benches heretofore used, has been granted, and an appropriation made to carry it into effect. A resolution was also passed to provide a pivot chair for the Judge. Both Judge and Jury will hold the Commissioners grateful remembrance.

FIRE COMPANY AND DEPARTMENT ELECTIONS.—Last Tuesday evening was the time for the annual election of officers in the Fire company and Department. The following persons were elected with perfect unanimity by acclamation.

WHITE DEER.—On Saturday Dec. 26th, G. R. Sterling shot a white Deer, near the head of the Trembelle river, in Wisconsin. The skin of the animal is now at the Boot & Shoe Store of Messrs. Sterling & Co. It will be recollected that several weeks ago we mentioned the fact that John Day had seen and shot at a white Deer in that vicinity. A person living in the vicinity of the locality where this was shot says it is the same one Mr. Day shot at, and that it had stayed around there ever since.

IN LOCK.—J. H. Brand Esq., the efficient member of the Board of County Commissioners from this commissioner District was re-elected chairman of the Board at its last session. While the Board of commissioners was in

session, he received a despatch from St. Paul, informing him that he had been elected enrolling clerk of the Senate.

AGRICULTURAL CLUB.—The farmers of Featherstone have organized a local Club, called The Featherstone Farmers Club.—Wm. Fryberger was elected President, F. N. Levitt vice President, Geo. Featherstone Secretary and Timothy Jewett Treasurer. The object of the Club is to discuss matters pertaining to agriculture. Tuesday evening, a week ago, they met and discussed the relative merit of sowing broad cast and with a Seed drill. There was quite a division, the meeting being nearly equally divided. At the next meeting they will discuss the policy of fencing a pasture for cattle, and not fencing the grain.

IN CASE OF FIRE, what would we do? Supposing a fire to break out on Main St. what would become of us? If a fire should occur, even at noon day, when hundreds of persons could be on hand in ten minutes, there would be no salvation for a single building on main street, between Bush and Plum. This is horrible to contemplate. It shows a terrible state of careless negligence and an utter unconcern about our own interests. The river is frozen up solid, and even if it were open, it is too far away to afford much relief. There are but few wells in the vicinity, and if they were full of water, they would soon become dry if relied upon in case of a fire, but they are already nearly dry, and are utterly worthless for any such purpose and so we can see no way in which a fire could be extinguished. It would have to run its course. It would avail nothing to build cisterns now, but the spring ought not to go by without at least two large cisterns being built on Main street, and ten or twelve more in different parts of the city. In the mean time be careful of fire.

NARROW ESCAPE.—There was a perfect jam at the Court House on the occasion of Dr. Akers' lecture, and Walter Sierns came very near losing his life by being crowded through a window. He fell (being pushed) his full length against the window, breaking his full size out of it, and would have gone out, and fell to the ground, a distance of nearly thirty feet, had he not been caught by a man standing near.

Those windows are dangerously arranged affairs, and we have often wondered why no accidents have happened. They are high arch windows, reaching down to within about a foot of the floor. We suggest to the County Commissioners that they cause a good stout iron bar to be put across each window as a means of safety in the future.

IS HE HUMAN?—Last Thursday afternoon Mr. Ole Anderson left Red Wing on a trial tour, taking the road to Hastings, and had the misfortune when about five miles beyond Cannon river bridge, to break one of the shafts of his cutter. He called at a house and requested that his wife might be allowed to stay all night, but the proprietor refused him this privilege, and himself and wife were forced to walk four miles to Hungry Point, before they could find shelter for the night. The consequence was that both of them were badly frozen. Would a human being treat a dog from his door on such a night? Such instances of meanness are rare, and a man who would practice such cruelty deserves to be spotted and shunned by decent members of society.—*Republican*.

Reference is made in the above article to Mr. Joseph Eggleston, a man who has an honorable standing in society, and is, where ever known, regarded as a man of truth.—He called upon us last week, and requested us to deny each and every statement in the above article reflecting upon his humanity or christianity. He says that on the day above named Mr. Anderson and wife did call at his house to warm themselves. His house is four miles from Hungry Point.—While there Mr. Anderson asked permission to remain all night, and the request was cheerfully granted; but upon informing Mr. Anderson that he had no chance to stable his horse, he, Anderson, of his own accord, determined to go on four miles further to Hungry Point. That when Mr. Anderson arrived at his house there was not the slightest indication of the shafts being broken, nor did he mention that they were during his stay, and in his belief they were not broken at the time. Would it not be well to learn some particulars before making wholesale charges, involving the reputation of individuals?

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY DIRECTORS.—We have just printed five hundred of the Constitutions of the Goodhue County Agricultural Society, with certificate of Membership attached. It is intended to give each member of the society one, and it would be a good plan for the Directors in each town to get a number, signed by the President and Secretary, and fill them out and give to each new member. Let us take hold and get the farmers of the County interested in this matter, and then we shall be able to have a fair that will do the County credit, but if we attempt to get up a fair, without first getting up a general interest in the organization, the fair will be a "fizzle."
