Indian Appeals From Decision of Hitchcock.

Ora Cecelia Robitaille, an infant, vs. the United States was the title of an action which has been inserted in the calendar of the next term of the district court at Fergus Falls. This suit is certainly an important one as it is to institute a decision whether Indian children are to have land allotments in the future, the secretary of the interior having held that children born after July 21st, 1900, shall not be given land as heretofore. The complaint sets forth that the plaintiff's mother is a member of the Mississippi band of Chippewa Indians residing upon the White Earth Indian reservation and also that the plaintiff's father a man of mixed Indian blood, and a ward of the government. It further states that an application for an allotment of the plaintiff has been made in accordance of the regulations for allotment of said Mississippi band of Chippewa Indians, and was accordingly rejected by the secretary of the interior, and the plaintiff further asks that the ruling of the secretary of the interior in the premises be set aside.
