A PROPOSITION

The prospective loggers that have been out from two to five days looking over the blown down timber have reported that the down timber which was caused to fall by the heavy wind which played havoc throughout the northern states early last fall, is nearly correct. The most thickly pine sections seemed to have been selected by the wind in its course, hence the pine blown is of the richest, and the loss in its proportion would have been great had not a way been found to save this down timber.

We learn that the greater portion of this pine to be saved, is underway by the efforts of Agent Michelet, and although final instructions have not yet been forwarded by the department, it is understood the pine will be handled by local logging operators and the season promises to be unusually good by reason of the present heavy snow falls. The only drawback will be that of hay, those that made hay while the "sun shone" may now reap their harvest.

It is further rumored that the sale will be made by advertisement, to be sold to the highest bidder under competitive sealed bids on bank scale, and the contracts will be entered into with Indians who are able to furnish themselves—and to cut a specified amount of logs etc., etc.

We do not know what the views of the editor of the TOMAHAWK will be, as he is away from home. Nevertheless the popular sentiment of the people on the reservation, is, that certain sections should be reserved for manufacture of lumber, where a portable saw mill can be run, and the lumber manufactured to go for agency building repairs, for building of roads and bridges, to be distributed among the Indians to improve their homes on their allotments, and for other purposes.

The reserved sections held should be conveniently located so the hauling of lumber can be accessible from and to Pine Point, Wild Rice River or Beaulieu, White Earth and other points. A few of the prominent members have suggested as to location and the almost conclusive point was mentioned as was located the old Johnson saw mill.

Of course, nothing should obstruct the allotments owned by Indians. To illustrate the scarcity of lumber among the Indians: A death recently occurred, (the relatives of the deceased being unable to purchase coffin) no lumber being on hand for coffin purposes, the lumber had to be borrowed from a distant neighbor who happened to have some. Such are the conditions on the reservation.

The foregoing is only a suggestion by the people for the people, and much weight remains as to the views of Agent Michelet.
