Supt. Hinton Reports Modification Of The School Bill.

It is learned from Washington that Supt. Hinton has reported a modification of the Steenerson bill which proposes to take away the celebration grounds of this village.

Supt. Hinton's report proposes the sale of the grounds to the highest bidder for cash at a competitive sale, and it is learned that the Indian office will favor this.

It is an absurd proposition to sell twenty acres of land for a school building when one acre would be sufficient. The scheme is no doubt apparent to everyone, and Mr. Hinton's report is undoubtedly favorable to the best interests of all concerned, excepting, possibly, the school and its several supporters.

Secretary Lane Visits Yankton Reservation.

Secretary of the Interior Lane, left Washington last week Wednesday for the purpose of personally attending the delivery of the first patents in fee to be issued to allottees who have been declared as competent by the McLaughlin Competency Commission. He was accompanied by the commission and the patents will probably be delivered with much ceremony. Secretary Lane inaugurated a

policy which should meet with the approbation of all progressive Indians when he appointed a commission to turn all the competent Indians loose.

It is learned that one of the commissions may visit this state soon and commence work upon the several Chippewa reservations.

Council Elects Officers For 14th Of June Celebration.

The Council called by Supt. Hinton for the purpose of electing an executive committee for the celebration here on June 14th next, met last Friday at the school assembly hall, nothing was done in the forenoon except to elect a temporary chairman.

The council met again at 1.30 p. m. and the following officers were elected:

ANDERSON AGAINST STEENERSON.

Congressman Steenerson will need all the votes he can get to secure a re-nomination to Congress, for he will have pitted against him Mr. Anderson of Otter Tail County.

Ordinarily there has been no opposition to Mr. Steenerson here upon this reservation, but we predict that it will be different this year, for he has not stood by the wishes of the Indians but once since he has been in Congress, and this was when he secured the passage of the additional allotment act after Frank Eddy has secured a favorable report on it, and it only remained for Mr. Steenerson to call it up.

Year after year the Chippewas have voted almost solidly for Mr. Steenerson and have to a very large measure wiped out their obligations to him, especially as he has repeatedly done enough since against their interests to cause them to become more or less prejudiced against him.

Last week he had sharp words in Congress with Representative Chipperfield, which almost resulted in blows, because the latter undertook to protect the rights of the Red Lake Chippewas against the Nelson amendment to the Indian appropriation bill.

Mr. Steenerson owes his first election to the Chippewas, but he has not always stood by their interests.
