

ATTENTION FISHERMEN!

Sec. 4808, Game and Fish laws provide that "no person shall catch or kill more than twenty-five Crappies or trout of any variety; fifteen Bass of any kind except rock bass, in any one day, nor in any other manner than by angling for them with hook and line held in the hand or attached to a rod so held." etc. Sec. 4873, provides that "no black or oswego bass shall be taken which are less than nine inches in length and any person catching such fish shall at once return same to the water," etc. No "wall eyed Pike of less than fourteen inches in length or one pound, round or undressed weight," if caught such fish shall be at once returned to the water. Sec. 4872, provides that "any person violating the provisions of this act shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10, not more than \$50 and cost of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than ten days or more than sixty days for each offense."

Several reports have reached here that persons fishing in and about White Earth lake were not paying proper regards to the above laws, hence this notice. A word to the wise is sufficient.

A Probable Murder.

Reports have reached this village to the effect that a young man, formerly living with Mr. George Oxford as an adopted son, was shot and instantly killed by a boy chum of about the same age near Fargo a few days ago. The report states that the two boys were playing "wild west show pranks," that young Grey, who did the shooting, was armed with a rifle or a large calibre revolver and, while his chum was riding away from him, shot at him, whether purposely or not is not ascertained; the bullet striking his victim in the back of the neck and coming out of the mouth. It is further stated that young Grey gave several versions of the killing and also intimated that the dead boy had committed suicide.

Aged Indian is Burned to Death.

Ah kah kung-ay-we nin nee or John Coleman, an aged and bed-ridden Indian, residing one and one-half miles east of Twin Lakes, was burned to death when his home was destroyed by fire on Monday, June 24, between 6 and 7 p. m.

The aged Indian and his wife resided alone and although she was near when the fire started she was unable alone to rescue him until he was so badly burned that he died within a few hours.

The origin of the fire is unknown.
