000,000 in liberty bonds, donated \$2,000,000 to the Red Cross. Now as a whole they are not looking for any special or material recognition for their services, but the majority are asking for full privilege of citizenship. I say square up with them individually the United States treaty obligation. Give them their just portion of allotment; make them full citizens; pay them what is due them. By this will define the Indian problem and curtail the annual appropriations of millions of dollars to solve the so-called Indian problem by the Indian bureaucracy or department. Now they will come to the doors of Congress for legislation granting to those appealing a franchise to live such as enjoyed by the white citizen; we want the unquestionable right to the polls at elections; the payment of treaty dues; the removal of restrictions on lands, and a voice in the court of claims of this country.

I believe their war activities, which are grand and noble demonstrations, ought to appeal and cause every patriot to reciprocate such legislation proposed by urging its passage in giving the petitioners freedom as every other white American enjoys on this American soil.

**Give the Indian a Fair Chance.**

For more than two hundred years the white race has had organized societies and used Government supervision over the persons and property of our Indians, all of which segregated them tribally, restrained their liberty and prevented their coequal chances for civilized development.

The Society of American Indians is a dernier pioneer organization of educated members of the race in an effort to overcome themselves the degenerating handicaps of this specializing and restraining oversight.

Let us all help, and, as citizens, jealous of our boasted democracy, demand that our nation shall end this baneful political autocracy, and they, too, shall have a like and common fair chance to become respected, and citizens in this—once all theirs—land of their nativity.—American Indian Magazine.
