Death of Mrs. George Hodgkins.

The many friends of Mrs. Geo. Hodgkins, formerly Miss Martha Leecy, will be pained to learn of her death which occurred at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Leecy, about 3 miles west of this village last Saturday. Mrs. Hodgkins was a victim of tuberculosis, and had been failing rapidly for the past few months, when her condition became so that she was no longer able to get around she removed from Mahnomen to the home of her parents where she remained until death relieved her suffering at 10 o'clock last Saturday morning. Mrs. Hodgkins was a most estimable young lady, a loving wife and a devoted mother, she was a graduate of the Flandreau Indian school and was loved and respected by all who knew her. She was 30 years old at the time of her death.

Besides her parents, deceased leaves a husband and two small children, Lenard aged 4 and Cordelia aged 2 years and 6 months, and four brothers and five sisters to mourn her loss.

The remains were taken to Beaulieu Sunday afternoon and burial took place in the Catholic cemetery there.

Wisconsin Indian Lands Fast Passing to White Farmers.

Bad River Indian Reservation in Northern Wisconsin, is destined to share the experience of Oklahoma, for many years "Indian territory," and exclusive habitation of the Indian, but ultimately thrown open to the white man, who changed Indian territory into Oklahoma, and made it one of the richest states in the union.

Bad River reservation covering 150 square miles, includes some of the finest soil in the state. It has a twenty-five mile frontage on Lake Superior, is crossed by two railroads, and is watered by the Bad and Potato rivers and their numerous branches. The entire tract set aside for the Chippewas by the treaty of 1854, was owned in common by the tribe. But of late years, the Indians are becoming competent to manage their own affairs. As soon as an Indian learns to talk English fluently—they all do now, excepting some of the very old members—as soon as they learn to read and write, and show themselves to be really "competent" to manage their own affairs, a "certificate of competency" is issued, the Indian if he has not already been allotted a piece of land is done so, and he can handle his affairs as he sees fit.

It is closely estimated that 275 tracts have been turned over to "competent" Indians within the past three or four years, divided among about 375 Indians. It is estimated that 90 per cent of these lands have been sold, mostly to white men. Some of these white men are now moving onto their lands on the reservation. Others, buying on speculation, are holding their lands.

The members of the association give as a reason for disbanding that the funds of the association were nearing depletion and with the coming of harvest and threshing it was thought that the gate receipts would not be such as to warrant further expenditures. The team had completed its schedule pretty well and a review of the games played shows that the team had made a very creditable showing.

Fourth-Class Postmaster Examination.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at White Earth, Minn., on September 11, 1920, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at White Earth, Minn., and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$459 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be at full age for all purposes at eighteen years.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.


