## Watching the Work of the State Lawmakers

### COMMITTEE BACKS BILL

Grain Marketing Bill Passes House Committee by Vote of 15 to 5 After Bitter Fight.

St. Paul—Passage of the House bill to make the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, the Duluth Board of Trade and the South St. Paul Livestock exchange and to provide regulation for such, was recommended by a vote of 15 to 5 by the House markets and marketing committee of the Minnesota Legislature.

Debate on the bill in committee was bitter, Representative Asher Howard of Minneapolis vainly attempting to have the measure referred to the house judiciary committee before the vote was taken on recommendation. Mr. Howard was supported in his stand by Representatives Thomas H. Girling and W. I. Norton.

Mr. Girling said the committee was being "carried away on a wave of possible good intentions." R. A. Wilkinson, author of the bill, charged those favoring referral to the judiciary committee with dilatory tactics.

Representative Howard said no bill could be passed which "would deprive men of property which the state has invited them to build up. If this bill is passed we should introduce another one, writing from our statute books the law which invites organizations similar to the Chamber of Commerce to be formed," he said.

Mr. Wilkinson started forming this legislation long before the legislative session began.

**Charges Bill is Being Railroaded.**  
"If you want to railroad this law through you can do it," he told the committee.

After the committee had recommended the bill for passage, it instructed Chairman Elias Nordgren to refer the bill to the attorney general and the judiciary committee for legal opinions and constitutionality.

Those voting against favorable recommendation were Bernard Girling, IDley, Howard and Scribner. Those favoring recommendation to pass were: Briggs, Conley, Curtis, Darby, Holmquist, Johnson, Moen, Neuman, Norton, Putnam, Rako, Serline, Wicker, Wilkinson, and Nordgren.

Representative W. C. Briggs said his best judgment told him to vote against the bill, but petitions from the farm bureau of Pipestone county favoring the measure compelled him to vote aye.

**Take Up Bill on "Futures."**  
The committee then took up H. F. No. 23, which defines gambling contracts, and presents dealing in futures in grain.

Representative Howard said this bill was one of the most important ever considered by a Minnesota legislature, and asked that a time be set for extensive consideration. The committee decided to consider this measure.

The railroad committee of the house by a vote of 9 to 4, recommended for passage the "full crew" bill. This measure requires railroads to provide an additional brakeman for trains of more than 40 cars. The committee also recommended for passage a proposed law requiring railroads to build crossings over tracks, the same width as the road leading to the tracks. This measure will require the railroads, in many cases, to build crossings from 20 to 30 feet in width.

**Expect Fight on Fuel Yard Bill.**  
When a minority and majority report on a bill permitting establishment of municipal fuel yards in all cities and villages of the state was presented to the senate, probabilities of a hot floor fight on the measure developed. The bill was ordered printed, and will take its place on general orders.

The senate unanimously passed a bill legalizing acts of the acting state auditor. The object of this measure was to allow Acting Auditor M. J. Desmond to sit on the state bonus board. Senators James Dwyer and O. A. Devold of Minneapolis attempted to put the senate on record in favor of government owned coal mines, but were defeated. The committee on labor had reported favorably a resolution indorsing the Calder coal investigation by congress, and Senator Dwyer offered an amendment asking for government ownership. The committee resolution was adopted after defeat of such amendment.

## NATION IN DANGER

Farm Abandonment Has Created Most Serious Situation.

Food Supply Threatened Through the Drift of the Population to the Cities—Now Is Great Opportunity to Take Up Land.

The question, "How is the country to be fed if the population continues to drift to the cities?" is one that should create an agitation that will bring about a reply that will mean a solution. The census, recently completed, reveals a situation truly alarming, one that has never been known in the United States before. The urban population is now greater than that of the rural districts by about 4,000,000. Cities and towns, each with more than 2,500 inhabitants, contain 54,318,032 persons, or 51.4 per cent of the total population, while the farms and smaller towns together claim only 51,399,739 persons, or 48.6 per cent of the total.

As is pointed out by an influential Chicago daily, "the drift to the cities is thus proved and, reduced to figures, showing a top heavy condition of the industrial life."

Farming is and must remain the basic industry of the world, and certainly should remain the basic industry of a nation with a continental area like ours. It is small profit to gain the markets of the world with manufactured goods if agriculture has decayed so badly as to furnish an uncertain subsistence for our people, and fluctuating crops are reflected in price changes that upset the economic life of the country. Yet we are within measurable distance of that condition, if the present or recent drift toward the cities continues.

Most writers on this topic take it for granted that young folks go from farms to cities merely to make more money. Doubtless that is something of a motive at all times and was a very strong one in the period immediately after the war, when city industries paid wages totally impossible for farmers to rival.

It is hoped that this drifting has reached its apex. Unless it has, and there still remains a possibility of its continuance, the effect cannot be foretold. The great wave of manufactures for war purposes has ceased, and with it the number of those employed in factories is diminishing by thousands daily. It is therefore hoped that there will again be heard the slogan, "Forward to the Land." If prices to which farm land has reached are prices prohibitive to many, the opportunity is still open elsewhere. There are states possessing large areas of good land that may still be had at prices within the reach of many, and it is doubtless true that in self-preservation it will be necessary to bring these lands under cultivation. The prices are not high, considering their value. Then, too, there are the lands of Western Canada, that hold out an inviting prospect. Reports from there show that the prosperity of the farmers there is not mythical. Farming there is conducted on scientific principles, and the climate is such as appeals. The production amply repays all the expenditure that may be made. The social conditions are of a character that make farm life a pleasure, and tends to keep the young man and young woman from pining for urban life with so many drawbacks. If conditions as above mentioned, showing such a large percentage of population in the cities and towns, continues, they will require food. The opportunity to supply it is by the means suggested. Go forward to the farm, become independent, and become a factor in supplying the world's needs in cattle, sheep, grain and such other commodities as the farm will produce and the resident of the city requires.—Advertisement.

## CREDIT BILL PASSED

Lower House Votes Favorably On Rural Credits Amendment—Other Measures Passed By House.

St. Paul—The rural credits constitutional amendment bill and a bill to restore the Minnesota grain grades were among a dozen passed Tuesday evening by the House of Representatives.

The measure governing the licensing of osteopaths was amended to strike out authorization for the practice of major surgery and in other respects and laid over. The measure to amend the law relating to removals by the governor of public officials also was laid over. Reversal of a ruling made the previous day reinstated on general orders the bill to give the railroad and warehouse commission jurisdiction over the rates and service on the St. Paul-Stillwater electric line. A resolution for investigation of available sites near the capitol for a state office building by a committee of five, was referred to the committee on rules.

**Introduce Auto Bond Bill.**  
A \$5,000 bond or liability insurance policy to secure personal injury claims would have to be filed with every Minnesota motor vehicle license application under one of fifteen new bills introduced in the House. The measure, by Representative Erling Swenson, Minneapolis, was referred to the committee on public highways.

Similar reference was made of a bill by Representative Elias Nordgren and Thomas Girling for interim investigation of state-owned cement making and rock crushing plants.

## PASS CO-OPERATIVE MEASURE

Organization of a national co-operative selling agency to handle perishable farm produce may proceed under the co-operative bill, which became a law with the signature of Governor Preus.

The bill, the first of the present Legislature's co-operative marketing program to be enacted, was passed by both Houses of the Legislature, the Senate acting last week. Copies of the law were sent to local organizations of the farm bureau.

The new law amends the provisions of the co-operative laws passed at the previous legislative session, extending the scope so that local co-operative associations may federate in state or intrastate bodies to sell their products co-operatively.

The Farm Bureau Federation proposes to take advantage of the law at once by organizing a national selling agency to handle perishable farm produce. The agency will be modeled somewhat along the lines made famous by the California Fruit Growers' association.

## LEGISLATIVE SIDE LIGHTS

A bill to abolish the soldiers' bonus board and transfer its authority to the state auditor was introduced in the senate by Senator Sam A. Raak.

Representative J. O. Grove said in a bill requiring telephone companies which operate exchanges to furnish physical connections and service to rural lines.

Senator Fred Bessette put in a bill allowing school boards to lease or build structures to house teachers and another measure permitting school boards to hire attorneys when necessary and pay them by the month or year.

Three departments, hotel inspector, boiler inspector and the minimum wage commission are abolished in a series of bills put into the house hopper. The duties of these departments are transferred to the commissioner of labor.

The owner of property on which a mechanics lien has been filed, may have the lien released by posting sufficient cash in court, and \$18 for each \$100 in the lien, in a bill recommended for passage by the house judiciary committee.

Representative A. J. Samec, George Nordlin and B. J. Keller have introduced a bill requiring employers to give 24 hours rest each seven days to employees. Exceptions are made in the cases of watchmen, janitors, caretakers of livestock, fire tenders and others.

Counties of less than 100,000 population may appropriate \$20,000 or less as a memorial to soldiers and sailors. The memorial to be built in the courthouse square or public park of the county seat, or, if the county seat has no park, at some other location in that town or city. These provisions are specified in a bill now before the senate.

Rent profiteering went one step nearer to destruction when Representative F. E. Nimock's measure making rent profiteering a crime was recommended for passage by the house general legislation committee. Carrying of firearms without a permit from the police chief or sheriff is made a felony in a measure recommended favorably by the same committee.

It will be unlawful after Jan. 1, 1922, to bring any goods into Minnesota for sale without marking thereon the manufacturer's cost, the manufacturer's selling price, the name of the purchaser and the price to be asked at retail, under H. F. 570, sponsored by Representative F. E. Miner and B. J. Keller.

By vote of 72 to 29, the House of Representatives yesterday passed a bill designed to make it possible for William M. Nash, former county attorney of Hennepin county removed by Governor Burnquist, to have his case reopened.

"I recently helped a leather profiteer—call him Peter Sweeney Johnson—to choose a library for his new Fifth avenue house.


"Among our lucky finds was a famous old English dictionary. The book was in bad condition, so we sent it off to be rebound.
