## NOTICE

### Of Meeting of Local Council of the White Earth Reservation.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That pursuant to the Constitution and By-laws of the General Council of the Chippewa Indians of Minnesota, a Special meeting of the Local Council of the White Earth Reservation, will be held in the Assembly Hall of the District School (formerly the Government Boarding School), at the village of White Earth, Becker county, Minnesota, on the seventh (7) day of June, 1921, (that being the first Tuesday in June), at half past ten o'clock in the forenoon (10:30) a. m., for the purpose of electing delegates to the General Council of the Chippewa Indians of Minnesota, to be held at the City of Detroit, Minnesota, on the 12th day of July, 1921. And also for the purpose of electing the officers of the local council, namely—President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Interpreter, for the next two years.

Special attention is called to the fact that there is but one General Council, and that the Council presided over by John G. Morrison, Jr., of Red Lake, Minnesota, is the only General Council of the Chippewa Indians of Minnesota recognized by the Congress of the United States, and the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs, and that the delegates elected at said meeting will be the duly and only qualified persons to act at said General Council at Detroit for the Indians of the said White Earth Reservation. Therefore it is both necessary and urgent that all resident and enrolled members of the White Earth Reservation attend and take part in this meeting, as the business to be transacted is of the utmost importance to all the Chippewa people.

## Indians' Progress is Swift In Canada.

Aborigines Apace With Modern Civilization.

Calgary, Alta., Canada.—An auto purred in the road. An Indian sat at the wheel. Once upon a time he had been known as Limping Coyote.

"Hurry children," he called cheerily, "or you'll be late to school."

Three ruddy faced youngsters kissed their Indian mother goodbye in the doorway and climbing into the machine, were soon whirling away to school.

Canada has done much for its Indians. The old buffalo ranges have been transformed into wheat fields and pastures. The Hudson Bay company is fast selling to farm settlers the rich prairie farm-lands of its old empire. Teepee villages have given way to towns and cities. The Indians, too, have changed, and their progress has been amazing when it is borne in mind that in less than half a century, they have bridged the gap between the stone age and modern civilization.

Canada's Indian population is now 106,498, according to estimates given in the annual report of the department of Indian affairs. In 1920, the Indians had 218,024 acres under crop and the value of their farm products was \$3,462,147, as against \$3,143,146 in 1919. Their livestock numbered 17,135 head. The value of their real and personal property was \$67,915,077, or \$674.43 per capita, while the average individual income was \$107.13. In the prairie provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, Indians broke 4,500 acres of new land during the year.

Indian boys and girls are being given an education in 339 schools throughout the dominion. Of these 264 are day schools, 58 are boarding schools, and 17 are manual training schools.

Testing Pleurisy With Coins.  
A novel method of diagnosing pleurisy is described by P. Lereboullet in the Paris Medical. The examiner applies his ear to the patient's chest, closing his other ear, while coins are clinked at the patient's back. The sound of the coins coming through a healthy, normally aerated lung seems distant and dull, while through an affected lung, through solid or homogeneous tissue a clear, silvery, metallic ring is heard.
