A Voice From the "Improved Order of Red Men."

(By W. A. Turner.)

"I am surprised that educated members of our order should use their talents in abusing the former owners of this country and upsetting the high standards of character that have been taught to us for so many years in our ritualistic work, and more especially at this very time, when, under the direction of the Great Council of the United States, we are erecting a monument to Chief Massasort to celebrate the anniversary of the peace treaty made with the Pilgrim Fathers on March 22nd, three hundred years ago. Let us have more of the milk of human kindness and less prejudice against the "Real Americans." Give them a square deal by giving them full rights of citizenship, including the right to vote and the use of their funds and property, and the free use of the public schools. Abolish all discriminating influences and give them a chance to find their own level, and I do not doubt that more of them will make good than those of any foreign nation that come to our shores."

Old Dakota Fort Work of Indians.

Location, description and theories regarding the use of earthen embankments on the James river, near Montpelier, North Dakota, form the basis of a recent article in the Jamestown Alert.

"For many years it has been known that an old Indian camp or former stockade existed near Montpelier, and the earthworks have been visited by many people. But little is actually known regarding the origin of these earthworks, which appear to have been used in part for defensive purposes. The old embankments are prominent objects in the landscape and are located at the mouth of Beaver creek, just where it flows into the James river, near Montpelier. Some of the mounds are visible for quite a distance, and a line of earthworks and lateral mounds can be traced south from the north line of the main embankment to the edge of a deep ravine, which runs into the James river valley.

An inspection was recently made of the old Indian fortress, if such it may be called, and a sketch was drawn of the same. The embankments show a most extensive plan and possibly sheltered or protected a large Indian village. The embankments now surround a cultivated field, containing about fifty acres. On the northwest corner of what was once the enclosure, in a mound at least ten feet high and fifty feet in diameter. Other mounds of much larger diameter but less in height are also found, and shorter mounds extending from the main embankment in lateral directions, are to be seen. There are no depressions but all are earthworks and ridges.

"In excavations made in the vicinity of these old earthworks numerous relics of Indian life have been unearthed. Residents of the vicinity have found numerous bones and copper articles. Whether the mounds or earthworks were erected by the Sioux after their dispersal from western Minnesota, after the New Ulm massacre, or by some other tribe that at one time hunted and occupied that region in the Dakotas is not known.

Curator Gilmore of the North Dakota Historical society, is of the opinion that the Cheyennes were more accustomed to the digging of earth defenses and embankments for village life, than were either the Sioux or Ojibways. It is possible that the lateral

mounds extending from the main embankment, may have been used for religious worship or some other phase of Indian life. To the student of Indian customs or any one interested in the early history of the American Indians, the mounds near Montpelier are worth a visit.
