Red Lake Indian Fair.

The annual Indian Fair of the Red Lake Indians, is in progress this week at Red Lake, September 14, 15, and 16.

The fair this year is bigger and better than ever, and proves that the Minnesota Chippewas are advancing with great strides along the lines that will eventually lead to their complete emancipation.

One of the features of the Red Lake Indian Fair that is always of great interest to visitors is the sports program. As usual the favorite Indian game of lacrosse will be played each day of the fair and several interesting contests will take place. Other sports consist of foot races, horse races, ox team races, squaw races, tepee raising contest, running races, potato races and several tug-of-war. Excellent music is provided throughout the fair and on the 15, the second day of the fair, which is also Bemidji day, it is expected there will be many visitors from that city at the fair.

In connection with the fair an Indian baby show will take place and much interest is displayed in this feature each year. Many visitors from all over the northern part of the state attend the Indian fair at Red Lake each year.

The agricultural department is attracting great interest this year as five farmers' clubs, all of the members of which are Indians, are in competition for honors at the fair.

Old Settler Passes Away.

William Truman "Bud" Warren Succumbs After Long Illness From Cancer.

This community experienced real sorrow last Monday morning when a telephone message was received announcing the death of W. T. (Bud) Warren at his home in the neighboring village of Ogema. Mr. Warren had been ill with cancer of the stomach for several months past and of late had been confined to his bed, he bore his affliction with great fortitude and with little or no complaint, until death relieved his suffering at 2:00 o'clock a. m. Monday. While his condition was such that it was understood that he could not long survive, the announcement of his death was a great shock to his many friends and acquaintances here.

Mr. Warren was born at Crow Wing, and was 65 years of age at the time of his death. He was a member of this reservation and a prominent figure in the early logging operations here. He was for many years a resident of this village but for the past ten years has resided at Ogema. Mr. Warren was a kindly man, a loving husband and a kind and generous father. His integrity and fair dealing won for him a large circle of friends who will feel deep sorrow at his demise.

Those of his immediate family who are left to mourn his loss are, besides his wife; five sons and three daughters, namely; Fred B. of Lengby, Minn., William of Pawhuska, Okla., and George, Frank and Clarence of Ogema; Mrs. E. Dalton of Dent, Minn., Ida May Warren of Ogema, and Mrs. Wm. Daily of this village. Deceased also leaves five brothers and four sisters, namely; Henry, who is located somewhere in Indiana; Frank and E. J. Warren of this village, and John B. and George Warren of Ogema; Mrs. Charlotte Maggah of Minneapolis; Mrs. Julia Ross of Pine Ridge, S. D., Mrs. Ida Tobin of Wahpeton, N. D., and Mrs. Harry Hull of this village.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon from the Episcopal church in this village and interment made in the church cemetery. The Tomahawk joins with the many friends of the deceased in extending sympathy to the bereaved ones.

Cherokee Indians Sue For Texas Land.

Formal notice of suit for one million five hundred thousand acres of land in Southeastern Texas and for recovery of alleged damages accruing from the State of Texas for dispossession of these lands since July 16, 1839, has been issued to Governor Neff of Texas by the branch of the Cherokee Indian Tribe known as the "Texas Cherokees," according to statement by Doctor Emmett Starr, of Oklahoma City, a prominent member of that branch of the tribe.

The notice, served on the attorney general of the state, and the governor, according to Doctor Starr, was that the tribe would file suit for the lands November 14th, in the supreme court of the United States. Permission of the supreme court to file the case has been obtained, Doctor Starr said, adding that the case was being carried there direct because of the peculiar nature of the litigation.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF SNEELMAN FARMERS CO-OPERATIVE MERCANTILE ASSOCIATION.

The undersigned do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of forming an association on the co-operative plan, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 382 of the General Laws of the State of Minnesota for the year 1919, and any acts amendatory thereof or supplemental thereto, and do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

Article 1. The name of this association shall be Snellman Farmers Co-Operative Mercantile Association. The general nature of the business to be carried on by said association shall be to buy, sell and generally deal in goods, wares, merchandise and farm produce and other personal property of every kind and description, and to engage in, conduct and carry on a wholesale and retail mercantile business.

The principal place of transacting the business of this association shall be Snellman, Becker County, Minnesota.

Article 2. The period of duration for which this association is formed shall be thirty (30) years from and after the filing for record of these articles.

Article 3. The names and places of residence of the incorporators hereof are as follows: Waino Hendrickson, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. David Kivinen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Henry Toivonen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. John Pavola, residing at Route 4, Frazee, Minn. Abraham Penttinen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Victor Johnson, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Ike Yliniemi, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Mike Heinsonen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Wester Harvala, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn.

Article 4. The management of the affairs of the association shall be vested in a board of nine directors; said directors to be chosen and elected annually by the stockholders thereof at the annual meeting to be held on the second Monday in January of each year, and they shall hold their offices until their successors have been duly elected and qualified; the officers of said association shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the directors and such officers shall be and constitute members of said board of directors and shall hold their offices until their successors have been duly elected and qualified; until such annual meeting the following named persons shall constitute the officers of said association: Waino Hendrickson, President. Victor Johnson, Vice-President. Henry Toivonen, Secretary. Wester Harvala, Treasurer.

And until such annual meeting, the following named persons residing at the respective places named shall constitute the first Board of Directors, to-wit: Waino Hendrickson, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. David Kivinen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Henry Toivonen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. John Pavola, residing at Route 4, Frazee, Minn. Abraham Penttinen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Victor Johnson, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Ike Yliniemi, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Mike Heinsonen, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn. Wester Harvala, residing at Route 1, Osage, Minn.

Article 5. The amount of capital stock of this association shall be Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00), divided into five hundred (500) shares, each share to be of the par value of Ten Dollars (\$10.00), and each share of stock to be paid for in cash before the issuance of certificate thereof, and no stockholder shall be entitled to more than one vote and no stockholder shall be allowed to vote by proxy.

Article 6. The highest amount of indebtedness of this association shall be Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000.00).

Article 7. Said Articles of Incorporation may be amended from time to time as provided by the provisions of said law under which said association is incorporated.

Article 8. This association being operated on a co-operative plan, shall comply with the laws of this state relating to such associations and the Board of Directors shall make by-laws not inconsistent with the laws of this state and therein prescribe the plan of operation of said association and the method of distributing the profits, which by-laws shall be approved by the stockholders of this association.
