Rev. Father Gordon Pleads for Indians.

A most interesting and very enlightening talk on the Indians in the United States was delivered before the St. Paul Seminary body of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade recently by the Rev. Phillip Gordon. Father Gordon, himself a full-blooded Indian of the Chippewa tribe, and a St. Paul Seminary alumnus, was introduced to the assemblage by the president of the local Crusade unit. Beginning in a humorous vein with the thought that "The Indians have suffered long and patiently from oppression and suppression, but, thank God, we have not yet been denied Expression," Father Gordon proceeded to make use of this lone weapon in a most interesting manner. Understanding his subject thoroughly, as only an Indian could understand it, he called attention to the conditions of life on an Indian reservation, and pointed out the difficulties which confront the Indian missionary, as well as the Indian himself, in his effort to

better his standard of living. The Indian, it was gathered from Father Gordon's talk, is not an American citizen in the strict sense of the term. This is not due to any desire of his, but to the peculiar attitude with which he is regarded by the United States government. While permitted to volunteer for the army and fight overseas under the Stars and Stripes, he is not permitted to have a vote in the elections of the nation, nor to plead his case in the district courts of the country. This startling state of affairs has come about due to the government policy of handling the Indian question. The Indian is governed through a branch of the Department of the Interior, and is subjected to more or less bureaucratic form of management. Each Indian is allowed so much money (a very small pittance indeed), and is fed, housed, clothed, and controlled entirely by this commission. He has very little, if anything to say on the question of who his ruler is to be; and for him the President of the United States is the Secretary of the Interior. The result of this sort of legislation has been to kill all of the Indian's initiative; and the government machine which controls his destiny seems to care but little for his personal or social improvement.

Red Lake Drainage Board Meet at Crookston.

Orders Final Plans on Huge Drainage And Water Power Project.

The Red Lake Drainage and Conservancy Board held an important meeting in Crookston last week. The meeting was held in the office of the president, C. G. Selvig, at the farm school, later on in the day a second meeting was held at the court house. Members present were E. A. Aubol, St. Hilaire; Axel Nelson, Holt; Andrew Johnson, Gonvick; William Paskewitz, Grygla; C. E. Boughton, Sr., attorney Red Lake Falls; A. O. Brevik, secretary, St. Hilaire, and George W. Walker, engineer, Thief River Falls, State Drainage Commissioner E. V. Willard, St. Paul, was present on request of the board members for consultation regarding important matters before the board.

The Red Lake drainage board was established by order of Judges Grindeland and Stanton two years ago. The board has before it three drainage and flood control projects—the Grand Marais, Clearwater and Red Lake. These are immense undertakings, the completion of which, it is claimed, will mean much to that section of the state.

The board received the report on the Clearwater project and authorized the attorney to arrange for the final hearing. Final hearing on the Grand Marais project was also to be arranged for. The appointment of viewers on the Red Lake project was considered.

A telegram from Adolf E. Meyer, consulting engineer of the board, was read, stating that W. M. Reed and Dr. F. H. Newell of the Interior Department had approved the Red Lake levels and plan of control presented by the board and that their recommendation would be submitted to the secretaries of the interior and war departments at once.

The Red Lake river project first was officially presented to the government officials in 1892 and has been the subject of 11 surveys since then.
