## SHIPSTEAD VOTE IS OVER 82,000

Senatorial Majority Over Kellogg Is Increasing.

## PREUS SAFELY ELECTED

Gov. Preus Gaining, Leads by 15,000.—State Republican Ticket is Safely Elected by Good Majorities.

St. Paul—Virtually complete unofficial returns from Tuesday's election show that the entire Republican state ticket, headed by Governor Preus, was re-elected and that Justice James H. Quinn was returned to the supreme bench.

Senator Frank B. Kellogg and Congressmen Volstead and Steenerson fell by the wayside.

With only 100 precincts missing in the gubernatorial contest the lead of Governor Preus stands at 15,292. His final plurality is certain to be approximately 15,000.

Quinn Has Decisive Lead. Judge Quinn, who had been running an "in and out" race with W. A. Anderson, Farmer-Labor candidate, went into the lead decisively. There are less than 100 precincts out on the judgeship and Judge Quinn's lead is 14,542.

Ivan Bowen, railroad and warehouse commissioner, apparently had the tightest fight of the state candidates. With 300 precincts unreported Bowen's lead over W. W. Royster, Farmer-Laborite, was 10,529.

Hilton Leads Ticket.

Clifford L. Hilton, attorney general, leads the ticket by a majority of 60,026 over Roy C. Smeiker, Farmer-Laborite. The rural credits amendment had a favorable ratio of nearly eight to one and in 1,938 of the state's 3,479 precincts it was approved by 278,958 voters, while 37,234 votes were cast against it. In the same precincts the occupational tax amendment had 249,814 for and 44,176 against.

Dr. Henrik Shipstead will have a plurality of 82,000.

Mrs. Anna Dickie Olesen of Cloquet, Democratic nominee, polled a total of 121,104 votes.

## G. O. P. ASSURED 15 MAJORITY

Republicans Have Plurality of 11 in Senate, 15 in House.

Chicago—A continuation of Republican control in Congress, but with a majority of 165 in the House slashed to 15 and a Senate majority cut in two is assured by practically complete but unofficial reports. While the Republicans retained only seven above a House majority of 218 and 5 above a Senate majority of 48, they will have in the next Congress a plurality of 15 over the Democrats in the House and of 11 over the Democrats in the Senate.

Tight races and belated returns left the exact majority in doubt, but the returns from the Third Kansas, the last district to report in the congressional race, apparently assuring the election of W. H. Sproul increased the Republican majority.

With the district in the Republican fold, the sixty-eight House of Representatives will be composed of 225 Republicans, 207 Democrats, 1 Socialist, 1 Farmer-Labor and 1 Independent.

Republicans Lose Seven Senators. In the senatorial contests late returns which indicated the election of Lynn J. Frazier, recalled Nonpartisan league governor in North Dakota, and the victory of Clarence C. Dill, Democrat, in Washington, did not change the general complexion of the Upper House.

These returns forecast that the next Senate would have 53 Republicans, a loss of seven, 42 Democrats and one Farmer-Labor senator from Minnesota.

## FRAZIER VICTORY IN NO. DAK.

Defeat of O'Connor Conceded By Independent Voters' Chief.

Fargo, N. D.—With 421 of the 2,138 precincts in North Dakota still to hear from, the lead of J. F. T. O'Connor over Lynn J. Frazier in the senatorial fight had melted to just 783. The election of Frazier is now certain.

With only a few more precincts to report Frazier is expected to wipe out the O'Connor lead and then begin the climb for his majority.

The lead of Governor Nestos over William Lemke in the gubernatorial race continues large. In the 1,717 precincts reporting Nestos has a lead of 35,000.

Supreme Court Returns. Returns from 824 precincts out of 2,138 for supreme court give: Birdzell, 43,583.

The question: Shall the initiative grain grading measure be approved, wins with 22,481.

Bitter Struggle for Senate Control. Minneapolis—Although it is now evident that the Nonpartisans will not have a clear majority in the Minnesota Senate their strength is so great as to prestage a bitter struggle throughout the entire legislative session this winter.

The league has apparently elected. 25 senators who carried its open endorsement. In addition claims are being made that six others where the Nonpartisans expressed preference have been named. That would give a total of 31.

## News Briefs from All the State

Condensed Stories of Happenings of the Week in Minnesota

St. Paul—Accommodations will be provided for winter sportsmen visiting Itasca State park, state forestry board has decided.

Princeton—State Auditor Ray P. Chase, collapsed from overexertion in the campaign while speaking here. He paused, was too tired to resume and fainted.

Austin—Fear of a diphtheria epidemic caused the closing of the Adams consolidated school, 20 miles southeast of Austin, following quarantine of several homes.

Waseca—A drive for funds to construct a new private school building for Sacred Heart academy has resulted in the subscription of more than \$51,000 for the new structure by members of the parish of this city.

Alden—B. F. Muldown, formerly of the Farmers State bank of Lyle, Minn., has purchased the controlling interest of Thomas Ellingson in the Security State bank of Alden.

Hibbing—Joseph Penosky of Ghena was fined \$53.50 in court here. He was arrested by Warden Woods for using the headlights on his machine to attract deer.

Moose Lake—The Moose Lake Poultry association has been organized. It has a membership of 28. Franklyn S. Emmert was elected president.

Thief River Falls—The annual poultry show of the Pennington County Poultry association will be held Dec. 12, 13 and 14, it was announced here. It is hoped to have 1,000 entries.

Duluth—Shipping in and out of the Twin Ports has been delayed somewhat because of severe gales sweeping this end of Lake Superior.

Minneapolis—Miss Gratia Countryman, city librarian of this city, was selected as foreman of the Hennepin county grand jury, being the first woman in Minnesota ever to serve in this capacity.

Duluth—Duluth's annual building record has been smashed. Permits for construction issued thus far this year by the city building inspector total more than the number granted during all of 1921. Permits for the first 10 months of the year total \$5,450,000.

Minneapolis—Delay in repealing the six-cent street car fare in Minneapolis is in prospect as the result of the fact that all briefs in the contempt case brought by the city against car officials will not reach the state supreme court before December.

Hibbing—A temporary injunction was granted Paul Shevchuck and Fred Novell, Brooklyn plumbers, in a decision handed down by Judge Martin Hughes, restraining the village of Hibbing and the plumbing board from enforcing the provisions of the ordinance which requires plumbers to obtain licenses.

St. Paul—This city has passed its \$5,000,000 school bond program by a 3 to 1 vote on the face of returns in 60 of 200 city precincts. Of the precincts reported, only two gave the school bond proposition a minority vote.

Duluth—Eighteen vessels, two of them carrying hard coal and the rest soft coal have arrived here over the week end. Four more vessels bearing hard coal are on the way. No soft coal shortage is anticipated but dealers see a shortage in anthracite.

Waseca—The Waseca county grand jury has requested the condemning of the county jail and the building of a new one or the complete renovation and remodeling of the old structure. The action follows the refusal of District Judge Childress to sentence more prisoners to jail terms.

St. Cloud—Jubilee services were conducted at the First Presbyterian church here in honor of Rev. V. Campbell, who retires as pastor emeritus after 58 years of continuous services, each person presenting the veteran pastor with flowers.

Tracy—Because of an accident on her first streetcar ride, Rose Myrtle Hansen, aged 20, of Tracy, was awarded \$20,000 damages by a jury in Judge F. M. Nye's court. The Minneapolis Street Railway company was the defendant. It is the largest damage verdict in district court in many years.

Willmar—A large number of relatives and friends gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Christian Haug in Pennock to assist them in celebrating their 53rd wedding anniversary.

Minneapolis—"Flivver" owners to the contrary notwithstanding, representatives of an eastern motor car concern proved here it is possible to knock down a complete automobile engine and reassemble it correctly within an hour, in a demonstration at the experimental engineering building of the University of Minnesota.

Deer River—A virulent form of diphtheria is reported raging in the north settlement, and one child, died after a short illness. According to the investigations made by the state laboratory, the cases are those of black diphtheria.

St. Paul—Price levels substantially higher than those of the past two years were recorded when a herd of 70 Holsteins belonging to the N. C. Johnson estate were auctioned recently at South Side farms, White Bear. Average price was \$322 each.

Duluth—The initial move to make St. Louis county the greatest dairy county in Minnesota will be made when a campaign will be launched by the St. Louis County Guernsey Breeders' association to take a census of all cattle in the county and to place thoroughbred sires in each of the numerous dairying communities.


