Great celebrating at the Sarnia, Ontario, Canada, Indian reservation followed the receipt of \$200,000 paid for land by the Dominion Alloy Steel corporation, which was divided among 345 members of the reserve.

Braves and squaws alike spent the night hours listening to the latest jazz records on the phonographs which have found their way into a new field. One or two player pianos sold by enterprising salesmen have added to the melody with which the reserve is now flooded, and several of the Indians have invested in automobiles.

The city streets in Sarnia in the day time were well filled with Indian men and women who stepped out proudly in their newly discovered prosperity. The women flaunted the latest colors in dresses and wraps, and the men folks did not trouble to remove the bands of expensive cigars, which seemed to be very popular with them. There is \$1,000,000 held in reserve by the department of Indian affairs which cannot be spent, however.

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A Correction.

In our issue of last week, in which we printed an account of the local council meeting held on the 16th inst., we stated, among other things, that it was stated at the council that a letter received from Callaway was to effect that that place had sent their donations to help defray the expenses of a delegate to Washington this winter, to John G. Morrison at Red Lake. A letter just received from Mr. Morrison is to the contrary however. Mr. Morrison's letter states in part: "I do not want a wrong impression to be created among the good readers of THE TOMAHAWK in this matter. The facts in the case are that last summer at the meeting of the General Council, at Detroit, it was agreed that subscriptions, to help defray the expenses of our injunction suit, be solicited from the Chippewas. Among the very few contributions made was the sum of \$15.50 from Callaway. This money was subscribed for the purpose mentioned above, and each subscriber signed his name to the subscription list which mentioned the purpose for which the money was to be used. This money reached me on Dec. 9th, and on the 11th I forwarded the check to Mr. Ballinger, and under date of Dec. 17th Mr. Ballinger acknowledged the receipt of the check in the following words: 'Your letter of the 11th instant enclosing check for \$15.50 to apply on expenses in the Chippewa matter was received. These little remittances all help out and I thank you.' About this time I got a letter from Geo. Bellefeuille, of Callaway, telling me that he was asked to endeavor to raise money among the people of Callaway for the purpose of sending a delegate to Washington, and asked my advice as to what to do. Immediately I wrote him to get busy and raise all the money he could. 'This letter is merely for the purpose of correcting an erroneous impression which might obtain as to the use this money was put to.'"

Christmas Public School Entertainment.

The Christmas public school exercises of school district No. 112 were carried out on Friday evening, the 22d inst., and proved a most conclusive success from every angle. At an early hour the large school assembly hall was packed to overflowing, even standing room was at a premium.

During the exercises the White Earth band, under the leadership of Charles Vanoss, furnished several fine instrumental selections, while Mrs. Frank D. Beaulieu presided at the piano and played the carol accompaniments. The school faculty, comprising Mrs. Louise O. Warren, principal; Miss Myrtle Schneider, kindergarten department; Miss Grace Snettsinger and Miss Kathleen Hurley of the primary and intermediate grades are deserving of more than ordinary praise and credit for the manifest qualified efficiency displayed in the mental and artistic training of the pupils who took part in the evening's entertainment.
