Second District Republican Congressional Convention.

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The Republican Congressional Convention for the Second District of Minnesota will be held at Grand Army Hall, at the city of Shakopee, on Tuesday, July 16th, 1878, at 12:30 p.m. The basis of representation adopted by the committee is as follows: One delegate for each organized county, and one for each 250 Republican votes, and one for each major fraction thereof, according to the official vote given for Governor J. S. Pillsbury at the last general election. The number of delegates will be as follows:

Four persons were killed in one day last week between Red Wing and Hastings on the river division of the Chicago Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad.

The High Court of Impeachment is still taking evidence in the Page matter, and will probably continue to do so for a week or two longer. The trial will cost the State from \$20,000 to \$30,000, and in the end will amount to nothing as we think it hardly probable that the Senate will impeach Judge Page.

Frankie Allen, a lad aged four years, the son of John H. Allen, of the firm of Beaupre, Allen & Keogh, of St. Paul, met a singular death last Friday. The child was playing near a man who was laying carpets, and no doubt noticed the workman holding tacks in his mouth, the child did likewise and swallowed it. The tack lodged in the windpipe causing immediate strangulation.

That Major Strait is continually working in the interest of his constituents has again been forcibly demonstrated. Besides securing the passage of several bills that are of great benefit to the people of this district he has just secured, through strenuous effort, an increase of mail service west of New Ulm, and since last Thursday the people between here and Marshall receive daily mails. The people between Marshall and the State line will also be glad to hear that daily mail service will be put on between those points by the first of July. This increase of mail service is of vast importance to the people along the frontier counties, and by his untiring effort to secure the increase Major Strait has once more asserted his friendship for the frontier settlers.

The Democracy favor the nomination of Hon. Ara Barton, of Rice county, for Congress from the Second District. It is quite probable that Maj. H. B. Strait will again be brought forward for the position. His services through two terms speak for themselves in ringing tones, and whoever is beguiled into the belief that the Major would prove a weak candidate for a third term, will find to their chagrin that his steadfast friends and supporters are not confined to politicians alone, but include hundreds of voters, regardless of party, throughout the entire length and breadth of the second Congressional District.—*Renville Times.*

If the army consisted of but 20,000 men the Democrats in Congress would try to reduce it to 15,000; if there were but 15,000; in it they would seek to cut it down to 10,000. They are a pack of arrant demagogues who know nothing about the military needs of the country. The special Washington correspondent of the *Pioneer Press* has this to say with reference to our representative in Congress:

"I will venture to state right here, with a full knowledge of the value of words and their meaning, that **Horace B. Strait**, who at present represents the Second Minnesota district, is the most popular man among Democrats and Republicans upon the floor of the house. He antagonizes himself to no one. His sound common sense, affability and unchanging good nature has secured him the respect and good will of everyone with whom he has been brought in contact, not only in congress but throughout the departments. He appears to work in the interest of his constituents, not only because it is his duty as their representative, but because it gives him genuine pleasure to serve him. I hope and trust that when the convention meets at Shakopee it will be found that the people of his district have humored themselves by sending delegates there who will renominate Major Strait and avert the calamitous result of a Democrat being elected in his stead."

The Democrats are bitterly disappointed at the failure of their witness Anderson to produce either the original or a photographic copy of Secretary Sherman's letter to Weber. A document purporting to be a copy of the letter in question was read Saturday before the Potter Committee, but the Secretary declares that he did not write it. It contains nothing which upon a fair interpretation can be construed as an offer to bribe Messrs. Weber and Anderson to neglect their sworn duty as Supervisors. On the contrary, they are urged to "stand firm" and do their duty, and are promised protection against the vengeance of their political enemies and that they will be "provided for" if compelled to abandon their property interests and leave the State.—*Lake City Leader.*

RAILROAD FROM BISMARCK TO LAKE KAMPESKA.

Special Washington Correspondence to Pioneer Press.

The committee on railways and canals of the house have a bill ready to report which was introduced by Judge Kidder for the continuation of a railroad and telegraph line from Bismarck to Lake Kampeska, in the territory of Dakota. Lake Kampeska is on the 45th parallel line, thirty-five miles west of the Minnesota line, and the present terminus of the Winona & St. Peter road. To Jamestown it is 155 miles and to Bismarck 220 miles. Jay Gould, who is reported to control the North western stock, is now, I am told, at Lake Kampeska looking over the ground with a view of extending the Winona & St. Peter line, and Kidder, who is always on the alert, anticipating the wants of his people, has introduced this bill to enable this road to be built when anyone wants to build it without unnecessary delay.
