

SLEEPY EYE CORRESPONDENCE.

Peter Metzger, living about ten miles northwest of Sleepy Eye, returned Monday night from Texas where he had gone for a new home. His reports on Texas life are not very favorable.

A young woman came down on the Redwood train Tuesday evening of last week and while at the depot waiting for the passenger train going east, she was taken sick. She was taken to a private residence near the depot and a nurse and doctor sent for. In a very short time she gave premature birth to an infant. The child was dead when born. The woman is a stranger here and was on her way to Mankato.

Quite a destructive fire occurred here about 2 o'clock last Wednesday morning on West Main street, totally destroying three buildings and slightly damaging another. The cause of the fire is unknown. It originated in a large frame carpenter shop owned by Frank Jaehn, which was almost consumed before the fire was discovered. The flames were soon communicated to the adjoining building, Mr. Jaehn's residence, and this was lapped up by the hungry elements so quickly that the inmates had just time enough to save themselves and a very little clothing. Mr. Schneider's residence was next in line and it too was soon wrapped in the furious flames. But by this time quite a crowd had gathered and they worked so manfully that Mr. Schneider's saloon was saved, although only a few feet from the burning building. All the property was insured but not high enough to cover the loss. Most of the Ins. Companies carrying policies effected by the fire have already adjusted the losses satisfactorily to the parties interested and paid the damages. This promptness is commendable and serves to encourage people to trust in insurance.

The long carefully prepared speeches recently delivered in the Senate by Senators Harrison and Logan in support of the bill, providing for the admission of Dakota, although good in their way, remind us of a lawyer arguing to a jury which he knows has been packed by the opposite party and upon whose minds he has no idea that his words will have any effect.

Although the bill has passed the Senate, it is almost certain to be killed in the house, for reasons which have so operated in the past and will as surely under similar circumstances again. Congress has shown itself incapable on more occasions than one of deciding a question of this character upon its merits. The desire for party power overcomes the natural inclination to justice which Congressmen are supposed nominally, at least, to have in a moderate degree. And justice, equality and constitutional privileges are not considered when a question of political importance is decided. It seems to us that when Congressmen subject principle to policy in a manner so gross and palpable, as has been done time and again in settling these questions, no criticism can be too severe.

The powers of Congress ought to be restricted by the constitution in such a way that its acts and deliberations could be kept somewhere within the limits of reason and common sense. Many a reasonable and just measure has been awaiting the tardy action of Congress for years and is likely to wait for many years more for the reason that Congressmen are so preoccupied over party questions of no practical importance to the general public that they have but very little time left for action or even deliberation upon subjects in which the people are really interested. The action is so slow indeed that legislation rarely comes until the need for it has almost passed away. Congress is an August body to which a great deal of respect is due, but it is so unwieldy that it requires a few more constitutional restrictions before it can get down to straight business.
