Peterson for judge of probate, 27; Chas. A. Johnson, clerk of court, 818. Meritt is elected coroner. The other candidates on the Republican ticket had no opposition.

What the prohibitionists could gain by Ames' election is beyond our comprehension, and yet a number of them voted for him in this city. We understand this is also the case in other places, from which it can be justly inferred that they acted under instructions from headquarters. McGill's election has given prohibition a black eye.

Our friends of the Post have switched off on the wrong track when they boldly assert that in the event of Cleveland's re-nomination he will carry Minnesota. In a presidential election Minnesota is as surely Republican as any State in the Union. The close vote on governor in the recent election is no criterion to go by.

The improvements made by mine host Seiter of the Dakota House are rapidly nearing completion. Never before have our builders made such rapid strides in the construction of a building. We do not blame our Republican friends in Redwood county in feeling disappointed at the outcome of the Senatorial contest in this district. The Senator should by right have gone to Redwood county this trip, but the trouble was a majority of the Brown county voters thought otherwise.

Carrie will probably issue another injunction to restrain the auditor from making the returns to the secretary of state, but this will only delay the removal a month or two.

A number of the private residences were brilliantly illuminated and there was quite a nice display of fire works. A few Democrats got up a counter demonstration and marched through the streets hurrahing for Ames, but the transparency they carried resembled a coffin more than anything else, and they were no doubt on their way to the cemetery to inter some political corpse.
