Resolutions were passed to instruct the Secretary to have the foregoing published in the New Ulm REVIEW, New Ulm Post, and Sleepy Eye HERALD. The directors have been authorized to take applications for members.

The Stark Farmers' Mutual Fire Ins. Co. was organized in 1884. Its object is to protect members from loss by fire or lightning. Every person of Brown Co. (except those living in incorporated cities) owning property to be insured to the amount of \$200 or more is entitled to become a member of the company. No dwelling house or any other property shall be insured for more than three thirds its actual value. Also no dwelling house, unless it is provided with good chimneys constructed of bricks or stones. Any property holder may be insured by making application to the Secretary, President or Directors, paying a fee of \$1.50 and ten cents for every hundred dollars or fractional part insured thereof. When an indemnity for loss by fire or lightning has been adjusted the Secretary notifies each member of the company, his proportion to be paid to cover the loss which has to be paid within sixty days. Every loss will be adjusted and paid by the Co. within sixty days. All communications should be addressed to
